If you would be happy to help in any other ways which may involve walking round the village, perhaps delivering news, shopping etc and you are under 70, please let Angie know.

#### Local Community Shops & Food Deliveries

<u>Aston on Clun Community Shop</u>, 660849: will only be opening 9am-1pm. Card only purchases. No entry to the shop, you will be served at the door. This is due to the lack of non-high-risk volunteers.

<u>Lydbury North Shop</u> Committee have made the very difficult decision to close the shop temporarily until the current situation improves. 'We feel it is important to safeguard our customers and volunteers, many of whom are elderly or in 'at risk' groups, and that it is irresponsible to encourage customers to visit us daily, against government guidelines, just to get a newspaper or a pint of milk'.

<u>Wall's Butcher</u> Craven Arms 01588 672308 are working on a delivery run to villages on different days but this is still in the planning stage. You are welcome to visit the shop, with the usual distancing precautions. They are also taking orders and payment over the telephone for you to collect.

<u>The Crown at Clunton</u> have closed, along with all other pubs, but they offer food boxes, a couple of times a week, with fruit, vegetables, milk, eggs and bread for £25. If you cannot pick up the box from the pub, there is a team of volunteers ready to deliver, please call Angie Salmon 661025. The pub can also order meat from their suppliers but fresh fish has become more difficult to come by; they do have some available so get in touch. To meet demand, they have been cooking a couple of times a week, a take away service based on their style of cooking, priced between £10-£16, check out local posters. The Hundred House at Purslow:

They are also doing large hampers of fruit, veg, milk, bread, eggs etc for £20. They are more than happy to deliver in the area. The contents of the hampers can be varied. Do call them if you would like one or with any item suggestions. Cash only for these boxes. Telephone 660541

# Thank you Clunton, the brightest star in the Clun Valley galaxy

Five days after I returned home from hospital with crutches and a hip replacement, my husband Jim died.

I was "stranded" at home, virtually helpless, with my best companion Dazzer. Then it all happened - friends in the village and beyond brought me meals, soups and cakes daily. They took Dazzer for walks, when he would go, but sometimes he refused! They stacked and carried logs for the fire, shopped, and one doggie owner cleared up the front lawn after Dazzer. Nothing was too much trouble.

On the day of the funeral they decorated the church and prepared everything needed for a sumptuous buffet in the village hall when around 80 folks gathered. Some of the men were virtually chained to the kitchen sink to keep ahead of the washing up. I have been overwhelmed by the love and generosity, and I can only remember, on the saddest day for me, being enveloped with kindness, friendship and empathy.

This year (because we didn't know the viral apocalypse was on its way) we are due to have a foal - yay! She or he is due around 25 May. Lily and Luna will be in the summer paddocks by then, near the Growing Field and we'd appreciate it enormously if you didn't walk dogs through the fields that have the ponies in around that time.



This is Lily's first foal and she's likely to be highly protective of it. We're developing an Equi Central system, which is the horse version of mobgrazing, in an effort to increase biodiversity and deepen the soil, so they'll be changing paddocks frequently.

#### Climate and Ecological Emergency Questionnaire Results

Following its declaration of a Climate and Ecological Emergency, Clunbury Parish Council supported the formation of an action group. Earlier this year the group delivered a guestionnaire to all households in the Parish seeking to know your views, hear your ideas and learn of what actions you are taking. We have now analysed the 51 responses received and the results are given overleaf. This is only a small sample and will not be a representative one, but the responses are indicative of the anxieties, actions and wishes of a proportion of parishioners and as such are being drawn to the attention of the Parish Council.

All respondents answered the first question but 8% created their own category labelled simply 'worried'. Where there were 'Yes/No/Don't know' options not all respondents answered, so percentages do not add up to 100. There was some uncertainty about the meaning of 're-wilding' in question 3. The term is a reference to 'letting nature take the driving seat', a strategy adopted in the UK at Knepp in West Sussex, an estate where livestock graze but there is minimal human intervention. New habitats have emerged and wildlife has proliferated, as described in Isabella Tree's best-sellina book Wilding, the return of nature to a British farm'.

There was some uncertainty too about the term 'climate-proof' in question 7. The idea here is that when deciding anything, the Parish Council should ask itself 'what impact will this have on our climate?'. This applies most obviously to planning applications where issues of sustainability in respect to materials, insulation, heating systems and opportunities for the generation of renewable energy arise. Thank you to all who responded. Many of you provided commentaries and all of these will be reproduced on the Parish Post website. They make interesting and sometimes contradictory reading. If you are thinking of switching to a 'green energy' provider take a look – there is an offer here which will put money in your pocket and trees in the ground.


group seeking to source renewable electricity at a discount, rather than electricity sourced from fossil
