Great War Exhibition

The exhibition marks the sacrifice of many local men in The Great War, some of whom appear on our Parish War Memorials: one at Purslow crossroads, and one in the Church.

However there must be many who served who came back, and some who did not return but are not on our memorials.

If your family has held the memory of someone who served in that extraordinary war with photograph, anecdote, medal or citation, please do bring that name and those memories to the exhibition. They may not have been 'local', but you may have become so.

The service also marks our Parish Patronal day – St Swithin's Day. Wine, soft drinks, and nibbles will be available while you look round the exhibition – and the service will end well before the World Cup football match!

Twenty Years On

David Pearson, with his wife Mona, tell the Parish Post how The Crown became a community pub.

ome time ago, Clunton's Crown Inn was experiencing difficult times, and a local chap suggested to me that we should 'do something about it'. The interior had been stripped of contents and the windows were boarded up. My reply was that it was not my line of business, and my preference was to stand in front of the bar and not behind it. However, such was the interest of local people to revive the pub, that we made an offer to purchase the premises. Our offer fell through and it came to our notice that others were interested in purchasing the building to convert it into flats.



This only added impetus to our rescue plan and our offer was increased to the asking price. This was accepted and the property was now in our hands.

We formed a company and sold shares to those people who were interested in joining. People gave willingly of their savings in an all-out bid to rescue the pub. It should be noted that, for many years since, no dividend has been paid to those shareholders, as every penny received from rentals has been spent on repairs, maintenance and refurbishments.

Just about everyone in the neighbourhood assisted in one way or another: cleaning, repairing, decorating, etc. We heard of a hotel which was closing, so we bought its contents and brought them to the Crown.

All of this brought fantastic publicity from radio, TV and the press. The minutes of the third meeting of the company state: 'GMTV interrupted the start of the meeting to film us'; 'Central TV to come when pub opens'; 'Radio 5 live interviewed yours truly'; 'Half page article in the Daily Mail complete with photograph'.

A local reporter had started this, by continually phoning me asking for details, as he had heard about us buying it. He wanted to be the first to know, as this was 'a scoop'.

At Christmas 1994, following a carol service in our church, we held a party in The Crown for all the villagers, who brought their own food and drink as we had not vet opened. This was attended by BBC television cameras and was broadcast live. The Revd Barney also attended and asked for God's blessing. BBC TV also covered the 5th and 10th anniversaries. The Crown actually reopened on 3 March 1995 so the 20th anniversary will actually be 3 March 2015. The dedication and effort put into this project by everyone concerned is commendable and has to congratulated, and now, with Andy and Della at the helm, we truly feel that we have a pub to be proud of. A wonderful community spirit has prevailed throughout. Special thanks to all our customers from near and far, for without customers, none of it would have been worthwhile. David Pearson

As a rainbow's colours strengthened over the meadows and rolling hills, spots of rain started to encourage us towards taking our seats for the beginning of the performance.

I had read about the Madame Butterfly opera before leaving, which was a good thing as it's extraordinary to watch the depicting of a tale based in Japan sung to you in Italian by a British group. It's amazing how much emotion something which you don't really understand can evoke in you. I'd had a similar feeling while visiting Avebury Manor in Wiltshire, where the kids were allowed to put an old gramophone to play. While the tune would have had no effect had I heard it on the radio, when heard on the wind-up crackly gramophone, while the kids billiard balls around a table, it brought a lump to my throat which I couldn't explain. In the same way, these wonderful voices overtook my senses and managed to bring forth all kinds of emotions. The pianist was extraordinary in his non-stop complex accompaniment to these huge voices ringing out in a grand country house room where the sound filled all the available space in the most mesmerising

In the interval, we wandered back out into the sunshine to indulge in a grand picnic which the Clunton friends had put together. The hour evaporated while people laughed and chatted and before we'd had time to tuck into our puddings the bell was chiming, calling us back to the next instalment. The room was once again filled with emotional voices which built to a final tragic climax.

News from South West Shropshire Gardening Club

im Hurst from The Cottage Herbery in Knighton kept us enthralled and fascinated during her talk in May. She took us on a grand, illustrated tour from one herb to another, giving details of growing, eating and other uses of each one. We started with Parsley, which often takes more work to grow than exotic herbs - folk lore claims it goes down to the devil seven times before germinates! Being rich in vitamin C, be grateful if it grows easily for you. We learnt that Hops can grow up to six inches on a good day - you only need four plants to grow up a string and you could indulge in "Poor Man's Asparagus", steamed and served with butter and black pepper. The proof of inspiration became clear when the talk ended and we all tried to walk rather than run greedily towards the plants for sale! If, like me, your experience of lilies consists of the Scarlet Lily Beetle chomping through your prize blooms, or clothes being stained by over

"Alpine beauty in Northern Yunnan"

Duncan Coombs has been a lecturer at Pershore Horticultural College for thirty years. He has been gardening since the age of four – an interest which inspired him to go plant hunting as far away as south west China. His particular passion is for the Genus Lilium which are not only grown for their glorious colours, scent and variety of forms, but also on a large scale as a luxury health food – if you are

more of a winter person, the flowers and bulbs are eaten in Summer to reduce internal heat!
