The defibrillator will soon be operational and has been installed on the wall of the Village Hall. Eighteen people have received training and are ready to help. The telephone system is being put in place. Gary Higginbottom, Jeremy Owen, Janet Krengel, Colin Pentecost and Claire Hern have agreed to act as the main contact points. If someone in your household has a cardiac arrest, ring 999 and one of them will be contacted and will get help to you while waiting for the ambulance.

It may have taken them a year of hard labour, but they have now moved into Kempton.



When Claire's ballet teacher, Rosina Wenham, moved to Wall-under-Heywood from Woking, many years ago, to start a ballet school, Claire made many trips to Shropshire to help her and started to develop her love for the county. She became a professional dancer and opened the 'Rosina School of Ballet' as a tribute to her teacher, but continued to visit the county. She brought Colin to Shropshire; he, too, loved it. The Kemp Valley Community Wildlife Group held its AGM on 18 March. The Lapwing Survey yielded very disappointing results in 2012, but the group

remains undaunted and surveys will be carried out this year as usual to monitor a number of bird species: Lapwing of course, but also Barn Owl, Red Kite, Dipper and other uncommon species. 

Parish Council Meeting, 21/3/13

7 councillors present + Clerk + Cty Clr Nigel Hartin + 3 members of the public **Matters arising:** The County Council is to be asked to look at the problem of flooding reaching a garage at Clunton.

AED: 2 people in Bucknell have been approved by British Heart Foundation as qualified to deliver 'Heart Start' training. This is offered to anyone aged 10 and over. Anyone interested?

Parish Elections: Nomination papers must be returned by 5 April, 12 noon. It is best to return the papers in person (to ensure they get there).

Local Joint Committee: Grant applications can still be made. Contact John Croxton (or look up shropshireljcs.com for details). The next deadline for funding applications is Friday 13 May.

Issues of government policy regarding social housing were discussed. This concerns people losing part of their housing benefit if they have 'spare bedroom/s'.

No crime reports for the Parish but some in the local area; alarm padlocks, alarms for oil tanks, sheds, etc are available.

Litter picker: A lorry has shed plastic sheets, which are now breaking up, on the road to Craven Arms. Could the County Council be approached to clean this up, as it is too big to fit in black plastic bags? Littering in the area is getting worse, any volunteers for the role of litter picker organiser?

Planning: the Council was raising no objection to applications in respect of 18 Kempton, Old Kempton Stores and Jasmine Cottage, Clunbury. No decisions to be reported.

Roads: The Police Liaison Officer will be coming on 11 April to look at the enforcement of the speed limit in Clunton, at plans regarding the Purslow crossroads and at the Little Brampton crossroads. Potholes were reported in Kempton and Clunton. The problems (road deterioration and safety risks) created by lorries were discussed. Any diversion of traffic from one area causes problems in another, eg reducing traffic over Clun Bridge increases it at Twitchen. This is a huge problem as the area needs to be serviced and some lorry traffic is unavoidable. GPS use can compound the problem. Could operators be persuaded to change their driving habits?

Correspondence: Letter from West Mercia's Police and Crime Commissioner, Bill Longmore: in an effort to save about £20 million by 2015, some police stations will close, including those at Bishop's Castle and Craven Arms. Ludlow would operate on a reduced timetable. Councillors expressed their concerns.

Finance: Bank accounts: Community: £521.64; Business: £3,710.76; Sports & Leisure: approx £3,600. Outgoings were agreed as follows: Clerk: £261; PAYE: £39; Clerk's expenses: £47.10; Crucial Crew: £70; Clunton VH: £10.25.

Next meeting & AGM: As the date of the AGM has to be within 14 days of the new committee being formed, the date announced previously is unsuitable. New date: 16 May, 8pm in Kempton VH.
