

Purslow Show – Judges' Tips our judges in the Cookery and

Store Cupboard Classes only make general comments, so if a label is near your entry it is not aimed specifically at you, but a general observation aimed at helping all entrants. Here are some of their tips.

Savoury items should be presented on a board or flat plate as this demonstrates skill, and shows off exhibits at their best.

Bread should be 24 hours old to be iudged. Knead well to avoid a 'hole-v' texture. A flying top can be due to under proving or putting in too hot an oven

Pies should be cooked 24 hours before showing, not frozen. An enamel plate conducts heat better for cooking pies, and a little caster sugar sprinkled on top helps appearance.

Store Cupboard items should have a full date.

Jams - take care not to over-boil fruit. Lids should be new, or use a wax disc and cellophane.

Lemon curd - sieve zest for showing and present with a wax disc and cellophane as it has a shelf-life and is not a true preserve.

Pickles and chutneys - fill jars to the top and use a new lid to avoid stale flavours.

Chutneys improve with keeping, consistency should be spreadable. Traditional honey/coffee jars are not airtight and therefore will not preserve.

Jellies - be careful not to over-boil as those with good pectin will set after a few minutes. Eirlvs Ellams

Hummingbird Hawkmoth Spotted in Clunbury

very year many people are taken aback as they see in their garden what appears at first sight to be a hummingbird hovering at the flowers. A careful check on the size and a closer look unmasks this imposter as a Hummingbird Hawkmoth, *Macroglossum stellatarum*. This one was spotted in the garden of Tansy Cottage.



The Hummingbird Hawkmoth is a day-flying moth with a wingspan of about two inches (50-58mm). It has a brown, white-spotted abdomen, brown forewings and orange hindwings. It is very swift on the wing and an expert hoverer. The wings beat so rapidly that they produce an audible hum and can be seen only as a haze. The darting movement from one flower to the next with the long proboscis uncoiled, completes the illusion of a hummingbird.

Parish Council Meeting 20 July

Eight councillors present + four members of the public. Apologies from Cllr Morgan and Nigel Hartin who was attending the LJC meeting.

Planning: Barn Conversion to six dwellings at Kempton Farm. Mr Bright gave a short presentation outlinina the application. Councillors had been advised of the application and had been able to view the plans on-line. Mr Bright confirmed that all the dwellings would be in existing buildings and that the newer Dutch barns would be demolished. An ecological survey for bats had taken place. There would be a sewage treatment plant in an adjacent field. The development would make provision for nesting birds. The existing barns would eventually fall down if nothing is done with them, as they are not suitable for modern farming methods. The outer appearance would not change. If the plans are approved the site would be sold to a developer. There is no time scale as yet. Mr Bright left the meeting.

Cllr Hoskins has been in contact with residents of Kempton. In essence there was no problem with the development but some questions had been raised regarding the size of the development, increase in traffic and the lack of 'green' space. It was agreed that a site visit was needed and this was arranged for 25 July. Comments have to be sent to SC by 6 August.

Matters Arising from the Minutes of meeting held on 18 May 2017

Footbridge at Clunbury: Nothing to report. The clerk has emailed SC but had no response. Cllr Harding asked that this be followed up.

Twitchen Noticeboard: Cllr Bailey reported that this is serviceable and the carpenter is now back from holiday and will carry out the necessary work.

Clunton Speed Check: Cllr Harding reported that this had been carried out but the results are not known.

West Shropshire LJ Committee and NHS: Cllr Croxton left the LJC meeting at Norbury to be at the PC meeting. The following were being discussed: moving the whole fire service control centre for the West Midlands to one place; SpArC; the budget for grants.

NHS: Mrs Jones updated the meeting. Hospital departments (A & E etc) are still in a bad way. Maternity provision in Ludlow is reducing more and more. Social Care is in a critical state. There is a problem recruiting more First Responders. A trial of physicians going out with ambulances had proved successful but had affected response times. Bishop's Castle Hospital will be closed for a period due to unsafe floors but Bishop's Castle surgery are confident it will re-open and be retained. Positive News: Bishop's Castle are piloting a 'Frailty Footpath' system for older people; the Meadows Surgery is working well and looking for funding to expand; Shropdoc has been named as the best 'out of hours' provider in the country but they are still having to trim back. Mrs Jones urged councillors to think about some input into the consultation that will start in September. There will be a lot to discuss. She offered to attend the next PC meeting in September to update councillors.

Roads: Twitchen: Cllr Bailey reported as follows on a public meeting held in Twitchen regarding enforcement of speed limits. Glyn Shaw had inform them the way forward would be to have a 40mph buffer zone at the each end of the village commencing where the 30mph signs are currently in place. The 30mph would then commence nearer the junction with Redwood Lane at one end and near the iunction with the lane leading up to the old quarry at the other. He will speak to the Police traffic liaison officer regarding this. He will draw up proposed plans for the exact placing of the signs and forward them to the Clerk for consideration by the residents. Once this has been achieved and the signs erected, we will be in a position to apply to the Safer Road Partnership for legal enforcement by their radar vehicles within both the 30 and 40 limits. The second issue is the increased use of the road by HGVs. This is currently an issue in Clun with continued damage to the bridge and street furniture. There is going to be consultation on preventing HGVs entering Clun. We have been asked to be part of this as we do not want them being diverted via the Twitchen.

Kempton: Cllr. Hoskins is meeting Glyn Shaw again regarding the main road through Kempton. There have been two further accidents: one involving a motorcyclist who waited 2 hours for an ambulance and the other when two cars were written off.

Clunton: Cllr Harding reported that weeds were still not cleared from Clunton Brook, one side of which is the responsibility of SC and the other the responsibility of the property owners. The Clerk will contact SC listing concerns and asking for a site visit.

Finance: Figures were not available. Payments for electricity and the Clerk's salary were approved. It was agreed that the Clerk would complete the forms for the 'Transparency Fund Grant' which will enable her to put items on the Parish Council Website. Date of Next Meeting: Thursday 21 September, 8pm, at Clunbury VH.
