Wreaths were laid from the Legion, Roval British the Kina's Shropshire Light Infantry, the Fire Brigade and local MP Philip Dunne. Clun Firemen were present and were most helpful in controlling and stopping the traffic during the two minute silence and the short service when the names of the fallen were read by Nick Matveieff.

Parish Council Meeting 13/11/14

Present: 8 councillors, the Clerk, 3 members of the public, Mathew Mead from Shropshire Council.

Apologies: Cllr S Jones

Review of standing orders: the Clerk has not got them ready yet; she will do so before Christmas.

Parish Land on Black Hill: On 12 October, a party of 13 people (6 Parish Councillors and 7 parishioners) met at Fiddler's Elbow to walk to the Parish Land on the Black Hill; this is an area of heathland with heather and bilberry but also much bracken and self-sown trees (mainly conifers); in the early 1900s it was a grouse moor and whinberry picking area. The councillors were uncertain of the exact boundary of the Parish Land, and of what should be done with it. Further research required.

Ashbeds: The County Council will be referring the issue to the Planning Inspectorate in due course.

West Midlands Ambulance Service: The Parish Council has been advised that every call is graded according to its urgency: red, amber and green (from most to least urgent), and has been some average figures for respective response times. but the councillors felt that this was not representative of the response time in a rural area such as ours.

Parish Plan Review: Mathew Mead explained that Shropshire Council policies have 3 layers:

The Core Strategy: development and aspirations for the county

SAMDev: development at the parish level (at present going through the inspectorate stage)

Place Plan: informed by the local Parish Plan, this identifies areas of concern/interest for the parishioners. The last Parish Plan (over 5 years ago) highlighted a number of issues. Some have been dealt with, some are still

pending action. The Parish Plan is at present under review, and the team is developing a questionnaire to seek parishioners' opinions and wishes; this should be distributed around the parish soon. Mathew Mead reminded the councillors that a list of priorities should reach the development team by 5 January, in order to be included in the 2015/16 planning round.

Transport Survey: Cllr Hill has been asked to fill in a questionnaire from the 'Future Development of Shropshire Community Transport Company'. Although it is difficult to quantify the demand (the revised Parish Plan may help to clarify this point) the councillors felt there was a need for more community transport in the area.

South West Shropshire Local Joint Committee (SWSLJC): met in Edgton the previous week. A GP from Shrewsbury gave a talk on the NHS reorganisation in the area. A group of GPs have done a clinical analysis of the needs for the area (Future Fit Programme). They came up with the following suggestions:

A & E: either at Shrewsbury, Telford or in a shared location between the two (a single site would improve the quality of care).

Urgent Care Centres: would deal with lesser emergencies and would be in: Shrewsbury, Telford, and possibly Whitchurch, Bridgnorth, Bishop's Castle, Market Drayton, Ludlow.

Care Centres: (like old Cottage Hospitals) where staff from the main hospital would have clinics.

Electronic Care: supplied locally via a computer (dialysis is sometimes delivered in this way).

Cross-border care: using the nearest hospital rather than the county hospital (eg Newtown).

Cllr Hoskins asked if, given a greater number of ambulances, the problems would be reduced. Mathew Mead said that 240 more ambulances would be needed in order to make substantial progress and that only 2% of ambulance calls are for life-threatening cases.

The proposals for the Future Fit Programme will be put forward in 2015, but it is unlikely that they will lead to a change in the delivery of care before 2018-2020.

Mobile Phones: EE was formed from a merger of Orange and T Mobile, some masts have been taken down, presumably to reduce costs, resulting in a loss of coverage in rural areas.

The council was reminded that the SWSLJC needs to look for new funding which will be allocated to deserving causes; it has approached businesses and received £100 from each of three Parish Councils The Chairman suggested the councillors should discuss a donation at a later date.

Clunton Burial Ground: Access to the burial ground over the property known as The Villa is made clear in the document provided by the Land Registry. However the owner contests this. Cllr Davies suggested that Mr Smith should be contacted.

Planning: Old Church House, Clunton: extension at the back - no objection.

Sunnyside, Twitchen: extension at the back - no objection.

Planning application, Clunton: members of the public and the press were excluded from this discussion.

Roads: A few *potholes* reported in Clunton, Kempton and Twitchen.

Coppice View, Clunton, speeding: no further progress. The idea of speed bumps has been rejected by Shropshire Council.

Little Brampton crossroads: no news; will chase.

Purslow: still waiting for the solution in respect of the telegraph pole; moving it would be very expensive. It was suggested that the pole might be secured

with a concrete base and the surrounding soil removed.

Shropshire Hills Cycle Challenge: In reply to the Parish Council's objection to the event obstructing the narrow roads, the organisers highlighted the fact that the event had been going on for 24 years and brought business to the area.

BOAT above the Cwm on the ridgeway: the matter is to be forwarded to Paul Butter (responsible for coordinating maintenance in this area).

Clunton Coppice: the new footbridge on Cllr Croxton's land is now in place.

Finance: Community Current A/C: £1,891.10; Business A/C: £6,890.52 (of which £1,000 for Parish Plan and £3,590.32 Sports & Recreation)

To pay: Clerk's salary Sep/Oct: £304.16; Clerk's expenses: £135.84; npower: £80.89.

External Auditors carried out their Annual Audit. A few points made: all assets should be registered at purchase price (eg street lights and burial ground); Precept and Council Tax Support should go in separate entries.

AOB:

Edward Jones has complained about the large amount of spoil and debris tipped on the lane adjacent to his house, causing the water to back up. Jack Huffer has spoken to the builder responsible who is supposed to remove it.

The AED machine in Kempton has been taped up: it appears that the machine got damaged by water coming from a malfunctioning gutter. The Clerk will contact Chris Kerry.
