More on Mistletoe

Mistletoe featured in the December issue and led to some growing on a willow by a ride on the Black Hill within 150 metres of the parish land. If you would like to find it let me know and I'll direct you. Interestingly, in Shropshire only about 2% of host trees are willows, but what makes the observation even more unusual is that this mistletoe grows at about 420 metres above and laws! about 420 metres above sea level, some 100 metres higher up than the previous Shropshire record-holder which is at 323 metres on The Stiperstones. Lower down, Dave



Simpson has recently spotted some growing on poplar, a common host tree. It is downstream of Clunbury Bridge, high up in a small plantation of hybrid black poplars



between the sewer works and the River Clun.

Equally interesting are plants growing on named varieties of apple trees (Ribston Pippin, Lady Henniker and Dumelow's Seedling) in Kempton. Mistletoe berries were 'grafted' successfully onto a range of others! Her method was to hold back berries from some of her Christmas mistletoe, rather than take them inside where they would dry and shrivel, and then, in February, she inserted the berries into natural slits, or ones she made, in two or three year old wood. The best growth is on the Ribston Pippin. Marjorie's one disappointment is that none of her plants has yet borne any berries - are they too young, or are they male plants rather than the berry-bearing females? Nor are there are any signs of berries on the mistletoes found by John and Dave. Tom Wall (660561)

Broadband for Twitchen and Clunbury

Getting a decent Broadband service really counts: Broadband affects everything from health to house prices.

The initial meeting to discuss the outcomes of "Shropshire Connect's" strategy for bringing a superfast broadband service to Twitchen and Clunbury took place at the Clunbury Village hall on 19 December.

The meeting, chaired by Nigel Hartin, introduced Chris New. Secure Web Services (SWS) Managing Director who talked through his company's wireless broadband offering. Do please visit http:// www.securewebservices.co.uk/ for all the information on the packages and services that SWS offer. If you are interested and to enable the next planning stage to take place, it is important that you register your interest in the service via the Secure Web site on Services or bv telephone 03337000227. There is no commitment at this stage.

Following the presentation there was a discussion regarding the quote by BT to provide a fast fibre-based Broadband service to Twitchen and parts of Clunbury (that are not served well by the current BT provision). That quote is due to be received by the end of February.

As outlined in the last Parish Post this quote only covers those properties that expressed an initial interest in exploring this option, although we expect that the required infrastructure would be of benefit to the wider community.

A second community meeting will be scheduled to talk over this Open Reach BT quote, and the progress made by Secure Web Services. Please look out for notice of the date, (hopefully in early March) and try to attend that meeting as it is likely that decisions will need to be made that will affect the community as a whole well into the future. Matthew Trustman **Clunbury Parish Council 12/1/17** Following the last Parish Council meeting, when councillors expressed their wish to know more about the Shropshire Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB), Phil Holden, AONB Partnership Manager, came to give a presentation and answer any question that might arise.

The AONB was designated in 1958; it covers a quarter of Shropshire and is one of 46 AONBs in the UK. The main purpose of AONB designation is to conserve and enhance natural beauty, while also taking account of economic and social needs, promoting sustainable development and meeting the demand for recreation. The Shropshire Hills AONB Partnership co-ordinates this work, and is hosted by Shropshire Council and funded, in addition, by Defra, Telford & Wrekin Council and project funders.The AONB takes and coordinates action including the following:

- Managing the River Clun Recovery Project, including coppicing, fencing and planting by local contractors at 11 sites
- Promoting a Conservation Fund with grants made to 14 projects in 2015/16 totalling £25,300
- Managing the Lottery-funded Stiperstones and Corndon Hill Country Landscape Partnership Scheme
- Managing and promoting the Shropshire Hills Shuttle buses
- Maintaining the Sustainable Business Network
- Delivering the John Muir Award
- Running the Friends of the Shropshire Hills AONB
- Providing advice and commenting on planning applications
- Participating in a range of collaborative projects

The AONB Partnership and the two local authorities (Shropshire Council and

Telford & Wrekin Council) are proposing the formation of a fully independent Conservation Board for the AONB. The advantages would be:

A stronger body solely for the AONB, with a more independent voice and the ability to:

- take effective action, balancing local and national priorities
- involve and engage local people and businesses in a better way
- raise its own funds and manage itself more efficiently
- project a higher profile, and be more resilient and cheaper to run.

The request to establish a Conservation Board has been put to Defra, but its outcome and potential timescale are not certain. The AONB is looking for support for this initiative from organisations (such as Parish Councils) and individuals.

Meeting

Present: 6 Parish Councillors, the Clerk, Cllr Hartin, + 2 members of the public.

Matters arising from the minutes of the last meeting: The footbridge repairs at Chapel House have not been done but hazard tape has been applied. The clerk is to contact the footpath officer (Richard Knight).

Cllr Harding to contact the police regarding a meeting which would take into account all the road problems of the parish.

Planning:

Hurst barn, Clunton: erection of 2 poultry sheds. The decision has been deferred to the February planning meeting.

Lower Coston Farm: to allow occupation of approved agricultural worker's dwelling by person(s) employed in an equestrian enterprise. No further news; Mr Beazley to be contacted.

SWShropshire LJC: Cllr Hartin highlighted the agenda of the next meeting, to take place on 9 February, in Clun Memorial Hall.

- Bus consultation regarding strategy, as 90% of the budget has been cut
- More presentations on broadband
- Reports on the Council's budget
- Future Fit situation

Some money is available for youth projects (£3,000 this year, £2,250 next year). Grants are available (max £500). It is suggested that parish councils contribute; 7 of them have responded. Applications for grants are encouraged

Future Fit: An independent review is in process. It will take 8 weeks to get reports; a decision might be made by the end of March. Consultation would take place after the elections. The future of rural maternity services is a concern.

350 people who were under the Knighton practice have registered with the Clun practice. However there are another 3000 that could register.

Roads

Clunton: One street light is not working. *B4385*: approval was given to asking for a tidy up of signage and for the road to be put on the list for inter-active signs.

Finance: C/Ac: £1,320.18; Bus A/c: £1,316.87; Spt A/c: £3,580.68. Expenses to pay: £607.23.

The councillors discussed the possibility of buying the clerk a computer. No decision taken.

The clerk wishes to attend an election training course; approved.

Precept: After discussion, it was decided to increase the precept from $\pounds 3,400$ to $\pounds 3,600$. Cllr Hoskins requested that, in future, accounts should be presented well ahead of the meeting to achieve a more informed discussion.

Next meeting: 16 March, 8pm, Clunbury Village Hall.
