Annual Parish Assembly and Parish Council meetings

These were held on 26 May in Kempton Village Hall. Eight Parish Councillors and one member of the public were present. Chairman Harry Collins, in his Annual Report, said that the main developments during the past year had been the installation of mains drainage in Clunbury and the publication of the Parish Plan. The Chairman went on to report that solutions to flooding were being pursued and that the War Memorial would be repaired in time for the next Remembrance Service. A coffee morning to raise funds towards the repairs will be held at Lawn Farm. Beambridge on 24 July. Limiting the speed of traffic through Clunbury is an ongoing problem.

Nigel Hartin's report emphasised the importance of the Local Development Framework, which included residential development plans, and the need for Parish Councils to respond with their views on development. John Croxton reported that in future it was up to landowners and developers to apply for development permission rather than wait for land to be zoned for development. Small villages could form clusters to agree on development proposals and it is likely that representatives of Clunbury, Clungunford and Lydbury North Parishes would meet to discuss this. The Local Joint Committee had awarded £46,000 of the £49,000 available for grants last year. the balance had been rolled over and another £49,000 was available this year. Local organisations are encouraged to apply for grants that will aid the community.

The Annual Parish Council meeting followed. The Chairman and Vice Chairman were re-elected unopposed. The Clerk reported that Hopesay Parish had expressed interest in working with

Clunbury on litter removal. John Hoskins is to pursue this with them. John is also working to get more detailed information on flooding problems to Shropshire Council. Visibility at Purslow crossroads is to be improved and the Clerk is to apply for an Environmental Maintenance Grant to help fund improvements in the Parish. A 7.5 ton weight limit is to be implemented at the bridge at Beambridge. Philip Dunne has written to the Government conveying the Council's concerns about Google Streetview intrusion. Repairs are needed to Millennium Seats in Kempton and Twitchen and quotes are being sought. The Clerk is continuing to address problems with the BOAT at Cwm Lane Cottage, Clunton Brook flooding and the bridleway at Ashbeds. The next meeting will be on 29 July at Clunton. David Hill

Reader's recipe Chops à la Victor Hugo

(don't ask why—that's just its name)

4 lamb chops 2 medium onions (sliced) 3 teaspoons horseradish sauce A little milk

2 oz (57 g) fresh breadcrumbs

2 oz (57 g) grated cheese

1 oz (28 g) margarine

Fry the chops lightly and place in a casserole. Fry the onions gently until golden brown and place over the chops. Mix the horseradish sauce with a little milk and pour over the chops. Mix the breadcrumbs and grated cheese together and sprinkle over the chops. Dot with the margarine and bake in a moderate oven for about half an hour with the lid on. Serves 2 to 4.
