As a young man, he wanted to become a professional cyclist, but when his hopes were dashed, he studied dress design to make full use of his formidable drawing and design skills. He then worked for a number of architects on some prestigious projects. It is perhaps no surprise that such a talented and eclectic man should become a film Art Director.

He was a brilliant speaker and enthralled with his audience his anecdotes, as those who were lucky enough to hear him at the Assembly Rooms or in Lydbury North Village Hall will remember. The film he seemed to be most proud of was Gandhi, but he was Art Director for many more including Gladiator and a Harry Potter. He brushed shoulders with many famous people, yet he was a modest and private man, happy to participate in local events (his Address to the Haggis on Burns Nights at Kempton was performed with great gusto), happy to meet and talk to people, but equally happy with his own company.

Film was not his only interest: he loved books and had a large library covering imaginable subject. He fascinated by well-designed and well made machinery such as classic cars and historic firearms

Latterly life had been difficult for him. spending many weeks in hospitals, particularly Bishop's Castle hospital of which he, and his family, could not speak too highly. He certainly lived life to the full and will be much missed by those who had the privilege to know him.


Unreliable Observations

Barbara Freeman's Muffin Recipe

When we first came to the village, Barbara very kindly sent me a plate of her muffins which were like no muffins I'd ever tasted! She later gave me the recipe, and even I could do them, and now they are being made not only around here but in Northamptonshire, Surrey and even Canada! They turn out so well – try them for yourself.

<u>Ingredients</u>

(Note Barbara's cup holds 250ml / 9fl ozs)

2 cups self-raising flour

1 cup sugar

1/4 cup brown sugar

1 egg

½ cup milk

½ cup plain yoghurt 1 cup berries

Flaked almonds for topping

Method

Gently mix all the ingredients except the berries and flaked almonds together in a bowl. Add 1 cup of your chosen fruit. (I've made them with whimberries, blackberries and raspberries and they've all been good.) Place in a muffin tin and sprinkle flaked almonds on top.

Bake at 180C, 350F or Gas mark 4 for 30 minutes. Makes 12.

Rookeries in Clumbury Parish: a Response

A crow in a group is a rook and a rook on its own is a crow - a key difference between the two. Rooks are social birds and nest in groups - rookeries - while Carrion Crow pairs nest well away from each other. And while Carrion Crows (and their larger cousins Ravens) will take carrion and sometimes sickly young lambs, Rooks mostly just eat leatherjackets and are thus the farmers' friend.

From a county survey begun in 2008 which found 549 rookeries (there will be many more) I currently know of just six within the parish of Clunbury.

The parish rookeries I currently know about are at Kempton (about 56 nests in 2008), Clunbury (36, down to 22 this year) and nearby at the bottom of Clunbury Hill (2, discovered this year), Purslow (41, up to 55 this year), Coston Manor (number unknown) and behind a little quarry north of Clunton (6, found this year). But you know better and if so I'd love to hear from you. I look forward to learning more ...

Chinese Couple Grace Kempton

On 27 April I spotted a pair of Mandarin Ducks on the Kemp by the footbridge in Kempton. The plumage of the male is beyond exotic: a fine crest, a generous ruff and two prominent 'sails', all coloured in a bold mix of orange, chestnut, green, blue, purple, gold, bronze, buff, white and black. Too exotic one might think for the UK and in fact they come from the Far East, but so

extraordinary is their plumage that they have long been prized by collectors of waterfowl. London Zoo is said to have paid as much as £70 for two pairs in 1830. A century later Ronald and Noel Stevens purchased birds for wildfowl collection at Walcot Hall where the population is said to have peaked at over 100 birds. They died out here but free-flying birds have dispersed from other collections, particularly in the south of England, and bit by bit wild populations have become established. Though birds have been seen on occasion in Shropshire since the late 1970s, it is only over the last few years that numbers have really 'taken off'. Recently I have seen birds on the Lugg, Onny and Teme including broods on the last two, and a pair was seen on the Clun at the end of March - perhaps the same birds as I saw on the Kemp. Have there been other, perhaps much earlier, sightings? Do please let us know.

The annual Parish Assembly and regular bi-monthly Parish Council meeting took place on 26 May in Kempton Village Hall.

Present: Harry Collins (Chairman). John Croxton (Vice Chairman), Nancy Adams (Clerk), Karl Bailey, Ian Davies, John Hoskins, Penny Marsh, Sandra Stuart Seabury, Shropshire Morgan. Councillor Shropshire Nigel Hartin, Officer Council Community Action Mathew Mead, four members of the public. Apologies: Malcolm Jones.

In his annual report the Chairman mentioned the refurbishment of the War Memorial and the improvements made to notice boards and seats. Flooding problems were still under investigation schools concerns over reorganisation remained. In conclusion he thanked everybody who had supported the PC during the year.

NH reported that Shropshire Council were anticipating a 'hard federation' of four local schools. This would probably involve a joint governing body and possibly a shared head teacher. Another consultation on the Local Development Framework will take place in September and a new plan will be published in 2012. LJC funding for grants has been reduced £29.000 this New grant year. quidelines available. A funding are

application is going through for Clunton Village Hall.

At this point Parish Councillors were provided with copies of the accounts and the Annual Governance Statement. These were approved. This concluded the Parish Assembly.

The PC meeting saw the Chairman and Vice Chairman re-elected for another year. SC is offering free residential property flood surveys / advice (contact The Parish Post for details). Richard Webb reported ongoing problems with 4x4s using the byway adjacent to his property. The possibility of getting it diverted is to be investigated. NA had obtained a lower quote for insurance and this was accepted. JH will produce a schedule of Parish Plan actions for consideration at the next meeting. NH reported that in future planning officers will charge for advice. SC has applied for a grant to improve broadband speeds in S. Shropshire. There will be a public Flood Forum at Acton Scott on 30 June at 2.00pm. NA to write to SC re damaged road edge near Clunbury VH & BT re damaged phone box in Kempton. Kerb needs lowering to allow wheelchair access at Crown Inn. Next AED training 4 June 10.00am, Clungunford. Road at Ford Cottages, Clunbury to be closed for up to a week in August. Next meeting of PC 28 July 8.00pm Clunton VH.
