March 1896 – Clunbury

This extract from the <sup>'</sup>Clun Valley Parochial Magazine' gives a brief view of life in the parish 115 years ago.

"The Confirmation. - The Bishop came to Clunbury on Saturday. 8th February. and staved at the Vicarage, until Monday morning. He very much appreciated the honour paid to him by the Bellringers, who had sent out 'spies' to warn them of his approach, and as he drove through the village he was greeted by a hearty peal from the belfry. On Sunday morning o'clock shortly before 11 the Churchwardens, and the Choir in their surplices met the Bishop at the Vicarage and the procession passed through the village to the Church, where they sang the processional hymn 391, "Onward Christian Soldiers"... The Bishop gave 2 stirrina addresses...The number of candidates was 21. and their confirmation was witnessed by a large congregation from all parts of the parish."

"The County Council are kindly giving us a series of Dressmaking Classes which are most popular, and are being very largely attended. They are held in the



Schoolroom at Clunbury...Miss Smith gives her instruction so clearly that all can understand, and we are much pleased to add the art of dressmaking to our many accomplishments!"

"In our account last month of the pleasant evening spent by the youthful members of the Clunbury and Clunton Choir at the Clun Pantomime, we omitted to say that the expenses were kindly defrayed by Lady Ripley, Mrs Mieville, and the Vicar" [Does anyone know anything about Lady R and Mrs M or where they lived?]

*"Reading Rooms. –* There will be a "coffee night" at Clunbury and Clunton

after Easter, before the rooms are closed for the season. Members should make good use of the time now as there is not much more than a month left." [Where were these Reading Rooms?]

*"Clunton Football.* – We are glad to hear that Clunton have again distinguished themselves in the football field – beating their formidable Clun opponents by 6 goals to 2." *Sue Hill* 

### **Pontesford Hill Appeal**

n 2010, people from the Pontesbury area lost 'their' Hill when the Forestry Commission sold it off to a private investor. This iconic twin-humped hill guards the gateway to the Shropshire Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and is treasured by the community.

There was fierce opposition to the plans to develop it, but now the current owner has agreed to sell the hill to the local community, as long as we raise the money (£265,000) within six months. Once secured, the Hill will be owned and managed by Shropshire Wildlife Trust (SWT), in collaboration with the local community. Along with the SWT-owned Earl's Hill, this will provide one large, open access wildlife reserve. protected in perpetuity for everyone to eniov. There are numerous fundraising events planned, including 'Α Celebration of Pontesbury with Mary Webb' (10 April; see diary page) which features local singer-songwriter Janie Mitchell and Benji Kirkpatrick, and a dinner with Nick Owen from BBC Midlands Today. ## On the Black Hill

ead south out of Clunton, pass through Clunton Coppice and eventually you come to Cwm. Look up to the right and there it is, Black Hill, rising to 441 metres (1442 feet) above sea level, the highest point in the parish. Home once to Red Grouse and Whinberries (but more perhaps of these aspects another time), it includes a patch of 'Parish land' - our land (and more perhaps of this too another time) - and is party to a little piece of literary history.

On the Black Hill (1982) is the title of a novel by the celebrated travel writer and novelist Bruce Chatwin (1940-1989), subsequently made into a film of the same title (1987). Although set near Hayon-Wye (where there is another Black Hill), it owes much to our own Black Hill. We know this from Nicholas Shakespeare's biography. Chatwin (1999):

'He actually began writing the book in the stable flat at Cwm Hall, the home of Martin and Stella Wilkinson. Bruce turned up at the end of October 1980 in a 2CV with a mountain bike on the roof. The flat, said Stella, "was just austere enough for him to feel comfortable and comfortable enough for him to feel austere"...

One day Bruce returned, excited, from a bounding walk on the hill above the farm known as the Black Hill. He had a title. "I am going to call it *On the Black Hill*", he told Martin.

In the room over the stables, he fell into a routine. He came to the main house for breakfast at 8.30, made toast, scurried back ... He worked hard till 9pm when supper was ready. Every now and then he played the great chef... "He made a turkey stuffed with chocolate and peanut sauce and a mad spice no one's ever used before or since from Jersey City. Everyone was full of admiration," says Martin. "Next day on a high because of the success, he decided to go for a *poulet à l'ail* ... But instead of putting in 30 cloves of garlic he put in 30 whole garlic. It was completely inedible ...".

Much though Stella loved her guest, she deplored his manners. "He was happy to use up your chattel, but couldn't accept responsibility for the kitchen of life. He lived two winters with me and I saw him for three meals a day and he did not once lift his plate from the kitchen table to the kitchen sink".'

But what a wonderful book!

Phone Boxes Reprieved We reported in the Dec / Jan edition that phone boxes in Clunton and Clunbury were under threat of removal (Kempton's phone box wasn't threatened as far as we know). Following consultation and



representations from local people who wanted the phone boxes to stay, BT have agreed to retained them. However, in other parts of Shropshire over twenty phone boxes are being decommissioned.

# News from South West Shropshire Gardening Club

**ooking back:** The January talk was entitled "Right Plant, Right Place" by

Frank Hardy about plants and their preferred soil and conditions. He started by pointing out that an *acer* might "survive" on a patio in July but it was far more likely to "flourish"



in dappled shade. He encouraged us to feel the texture of our soil to ascertain the amount of sand or clay present. "Great dollops of wheat straw and loads of nutrients" will improve soil with clay in it. He was keen to encourage the use of conifers to provide an evergreen backbone for the garden. Red, blue and green grasses put together can look fantastic without having to rely on flowers.

### Next meeting:

The Restoration of Attingham Park's Walled Garden: a talk by Head Gardener Kate Nicoll. Wednesday 25 March, 7.30pm, Lydbury North Village Hall. Dr Kate Nicoll and her colleagues have been working for six vears, in order to restore the eighteenth century walled kitchen aarden at Attingham Park. It is a rare and excellent example, which, unlike many other walled gardens, was fortunately not Victorian modernised in times or demolished due to becoming economicallv unviable. When Kate started working in the garden in 2009 she was daunted by its massive scale: a huge two acre site of earth, grass and walls. It had fallen on sad times since the war but is now once again supplying the estate and café with home grown produce and flowers. Entrance free to members. visitors £3 including refreshments.
