ean Seckington, **U** of Twitchen. has long had an ambition to create wild flower meadow. When the opportunity came up to buy the small field behind her bungalow in 2004.



she was able to begin to turn her dream into reality.

The first task was to try to find a way to rid the 0.9 acre field of bracken. Jean sought help from the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty experts whose advice to pull it out by hand proved to be very hard work but not very effective. The Shropshire Wildlife Trust advised her to use a selective weed killer, which has proved more effective but equally hard work, as she painstakingly divided the field into small sections to ensure that individual bracken plants were sprayed. Bracken continues to be a problem in some parts but the field has now reverted predominantly to grass and over time wild flowers are establishing themselves - at the moment cowslips, violets, celandines and dog's mercury are all in flower.

Apart from encouraging natural regeneration Jean also sows seed (including 2 kilos of yellow rattle seed!) and is trying to establish plants such as ox-eye daisy and poppy. With help from family and friends she has planted 14 individual trees (British native species) and 300 hedge trees (which were free from Shropshire Council as part of a scheme to encourage land owners to replace hedges). The grass has up to now been managed by cutting in late September, when the flowering season is over, but now that the field has been

securely fenced Jean is hoping to put a few sheep in over the winter. They will not only help to keep the grass under control but also provide free fertiliser!

A project of this sort is very hard work but for Jean it is obviously a labour of love and we hope to bring you news of how it progresses in the future.

The meeting was held on 20 April with Barney Bell in the chair. Church Warden Christina Whitehead reported that the church building contents and were in good condition. most significant

event of the year was the restoration and re-hanging of the bells. Particular thanks go to Roger Webb, John Croxton and Barbara Freeman for their help. Fundraising events included an Auction of Promises, a talk by Roy Lancaster, a Gift Day and Harvest Supper. Monies from the Harvest Supper went to support Farm Africa and donations were also sent to the British Legion and Shropshire Historic Churches Trust.

The Treasurer reported that there had been a deficit of £5,588 for the year, largely due to the cost of restoring the bells (total cost approx. £23,000 spread over two years). The year-end financial assets were £42,549.

The existing PCC members and officers agreed to continue in post with the exception of Karl Bailey, Secretary, who stood down. Tim Record agreed to take Karl's place. Carol Griffiths was elected as a new PCC member.

Financial support in the form of a loan and / or donation to St Mary's, Clunton to assist with the cost of roof repairs was agreed in principle.

PCC members were greatly saddened by the death of Joyce Brough who had been a great supporter of the church.

A plaque commemorating Ron Mold's contribution to the church will be put up.

A book listing headstone inscriptions from Clunbury graveyard has been found in the Church safe. This could be a useful aid to family history researchers.

Parish Council Meeting

Clunbury Parish Council met on 25 March. The full minutes of the meeting will appear on the parish website and notice boards when they are available.

A letter will be written to Shropshire Council with specific details regarding flooding to roads etc in the Parish. There was also some discussion regarding responsibility for clearing Clunton Brook to avoid flooding. The Highways department at Shropshire Council will be re-contacted regarding traffic calming in Clunbury and roads used inappropriately in the Parish by HGVs etc. A vehicle weight limit will be trialled at the bridge in Beambridge.

Some progress was made on tackling issues raised in the Parish Plan, and the Council agreed to take forward discussions to increase the number of notice boards around the Parish. Discussions will also take place with neighbouring Parish Councils regarding joint litter picking and NHS Dentist provision in the area. Surplus funds from the Parish Plan group were returned to the PC on the proviso that the monies be used to progress items from the Parish Plan.

Vice-Chairman John Croxton had attended the latest Local Joint Committee meeting where provision of Broadband in the area was discussed. John advised that the next round of LJC grant funding starts later in the year and suggested everyone think about suitable grants to apply for.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held on Wednesday 26 May at Kempton Village Hall, 8.00pm.
