Fairy Story or Hoar(y) Tale?

The Clunbury Fairy Stone is something we had heard about, but until we were asked twice in one week by passers-by about its location, we had never tried to find it. With vague directions we set off up Clunbury Hill on a lovely spring morning following a green track bordered by primroses and violets. After quite a climb, (with a few stops along the way to admire the views or more truthfully to get our breath back), we found the stone in a grassy field.

It's not much to look at – indeed you would not give it a second glance if it was not for the fact that



it is the only stone in sight amid fields of green pasture. It was obviously unusual enough to be marked on old maps and to become the focus of local tales in days gone by. It was thought to be a standing stone and as such a place of supernatural power associated with fairy lights.

One story has it that a man returning home one evening across Clunbury Hill saw lights bobbing up and down around the stone. He did not want to go out of his way so walked through them and found when he got home that his trousers had scorch marks where they had been touched by the lights!

In truth the stone is a glacial erratic of Rhayader Grit deposited here during the Ice Age and is more likely to be a 'hoar' stone than a 'standing stone'. Hoar stones are fairly common locally – they mark the boundaries between parishes and our Fairy Stone is close to the boundary between Clunbury and Clungunford Parishes.

Snakes Rear Their Handsome Heads in Kempton

Fritillary, Snake's Head, Chequered Lily, Folfalarum and Sulky Ladies are just some of the many names given to a plant recently flowering in wanton profusion in a garden in Kempton. Bulbs were first



planted here nearly 20 years ago; seed was scattered too, and now the plants,



hundreds in number, are multiplying, and yielding seeds which are being scattered in other south Shropshire gardens in Clun, on Clee Hill and near Shelve too. Fritillaries were

once widespread across the country, to be found in the wild in 27 counties; now a tally of just 27 or so meadows has been estimated. A plant of damp, river-valley hay meadows, few of their many favoured sites escaped drainage, ploughing re-seeding and fertilising. They grow in the wild not that far away: the Lugg Meadows, Herefordshire, and at Motte Meadows, Staffordshire, but the only records of Fritillaries in Shropshire come from naturalised populations. J F M Dovaston, a well-known horticulturalist, introduced them to fields at West Felton, near Oswestry (they were there in 1841 but no longer persist) and they were recorded from Lydham churchyard in 2006 (are they still there?). Flowering used to peak in the first few days of May, when celebratory events were held for this most distinctive and handsome plant, but nowadays the majority bloom a couple of weeks earlier. Readily obtainable from garden centres, more and more are to be found in gardens, but in few of them can they be as numerous as they are at Bridge House, Kempton.

Have Your Say: Healthwatch Shropshire urges people to speak out over the future of our health services

Healthwatch Shropshire is the independent health and social care champion for people in Shropshire. It gathers the views of local people and feeds back to those who provide and commission NHS services.

The NHS Future Fit programme focuses on the hospital services provided by Shrewsbury and Telford Hospital NHS Trust (SaTH) and Shropshire Community Health NHS Trust (SCHT), with the aim of improving acute and community hospital services in Shropshire.

For the past three years, work has been carried out on a Clinical Services Review. The NHS organisations that have overall responsibility for this review are Shropshire Clinical Commissioning Group (SCCG) and Telford and Wrekin Clinical Commissioning Group (T&W CCG). They are responsible for deciding which health services will be provided in the county and they also pay for them.

There are proposals for a new clinical model and a 'preferred option' but both CCGs stress that **this is not a final decision**. They are going to share these proposals with the public and ask them what they think. It is hoped that a public consultation will begin later this year.

Jane Randall-Smith, Chief Officer of Healthwatch Shropshire, said:

"It's crucial that the public do get involved and make their views known. The long term future of services and where these services will be located could potentially affect everyone at some point in their lives. This is not just about A&E but about improving the quality and sustainability of all services over the next 20 years."
