'Cluster' or 'Countryside'? Development Plan Meeting

As reported in September's Parish Post Shropshire Council has asked Clunbury Parish Council to decide whether one or more settlements within the parish should be designated a 'Cluster', or if the whole parish should be designated 'Countryside' for planning purposes. The Parish Council has until the end of the year to respond. The meeting was called to gain the views of residents of the parish and twenty-three people (including six Parish Councillors) attended. Cllr John Hoskins gave a presentation concerning the development planning options that are available to the parish.

Settlements designated as part of a 'Cluster' would have the potential for new open market housing (and economic) development, but at a scale that is sympathetic to the character of the settlement and its environs.

Designation as 'Countryside' means that new development would be more strictly controlled, but does allow for small scale house building to satisfy specific requirements.

Both designations allow for affordable housing to meet local needs.

A lively discussion followed the presentation, during which it was pointed out that the wishes of the community, as identified in the 2009 Parish Plan, were more in line with support for a 'Countryside' designation. The need for new consultation with all parishioners was recognised, and Councillors said this should form part of the Parish Plan revision process which is due to take place in 2014. A decision now to adopt either option was not set in stone – changes could be made at a later date, although change from 'Cluster' to 'Countryside' was likely to be more problematic than changing from 'Countryside' to 'Cluster'.

A show of hands revealed a strong preference, amongst those in attendance, for the 'Countryside' option. This information will be discussed at the next Parish Council meeting on Thursday 14 November (<u>not 7th as previously advertised</u>) in Kempton Village Hall at 8pm. The meeting is open to the public.

The Abu Dhabi Charity Shop Experience

On my frequent visits to Abu Dhabi I attend St Andrew's Church which is in the Diocese of Cyprus and the Gulf. I have been helping out in their charity shop - known as The Thrift Shop - for a number of years.

The Thrift Shop was first opened in the early 1970s, based in a very simple prefabricated hut, next to the Church. It sold mostly clothes in the early days and, as there were no dress shops in Abu Dhabi at that time, most expatriate wives made their own, using fabric available from a few stalls in the souk. The shop sold the Abu Dhabi dress pattern which made a long modest dress, with cap sleeves and usually an elasticated neckline – sounds very stylish! In the early days, the Thrift Centre was the only place where expats could buy toys and it provided an exciting outing for children after school.

In 1984, the church moved to a new site and was consecrated on St Andrew's Day by the second Bishop of the Diocese, Harry Moore - now retired and living in Hopesay, Shropshire. A separate building houses the shop within the St Andrew's Centre, which is run entirely by volunteers, is open 3 days a week and is very busy with customers from every nationality living in the city. Donations pour in, as there is constant movement of expatriates in and out of the city - and therefore continuous supply а unwanted goods. Stock ranges from clothes to household goods, toys and books - in fact almost anything can turn up, especially in early summer when many expatriate families have a clear out before they return home. A complete set of golf clubs arrived on a recent visit!

There is a regular turn round of books, and those replaced are collected for a library that has been set up at a work camp for construction workers. Volunteers check electrical items and toys to ensure they are in working order. I

often have the job of putting toys together or counting jigsaw puzzle pieces!

There are frequent special sales – half price day – or a school uniform sale. This helps to clear the stock and make room for new. Items that remain unsold are sent to work camps, refugee centres or to Red Crescent – part of the International Red Cross. Very little is thrown away or wasted.

Many of the regular customers buy goods and send them back to their families in other parts of the world. Prices are very low – most clothes sell for a few dirhams – from 50p to £2, and there is rarely anything for sale at more than the equivalent of £10. Last year the shop raised around £85,000 which helped to provide charity schools and orphanages in India, and help needy people in Abu Dhabi.

In the UK, most high streets have several Charity Shops, but in Abu Dhabi – with a population of around 900,000 in the city, there is only one. The majority of people living and working In Abu Dhabi are expatriates, but there is a huge range of standards of living. It takes a team of dedicated volunteers to run this shop – but it is providing a valuable service. It is an experience I am glad I have not missed
