A Beetle Bonanza?

re you hosting huddles of ladybirds? They appear out of nowhere, are undemanding and innocuous, or so it seems, and everyone loves a ladvbird. don't they? Hence the collective term 'a loveliness of ladybirds'. Apparently, there are 52 British species of ladybird, but we are now home to a new one, the Harlequin.

First spotted in a pub garden in Essex in 2004, it has since spread throughout the country. A native of Asia, it was used for aphid control in Europe and America, and, familiar and predictable story. some escaped and proliferated. And now we find that they don't just eat aphids but other ladybirds too, they poo a sticky black substance, smear surfaces with 'reflex blood' that seeps from their joints and can give you a nasty nip though these are all phenomena that I have read about rather than experienced. How to identify them? Difficult. because they can be orange with lots of black spots, black with just two orange spots, and a range of variations on



these basic types, but if you have little clusters in quiet corners, it is probably them. Should we call them 'a horror of harlequins'?

Another recent arrival in Kempton has been the Lesser Mealworm beetle. Up to 6mm in length these little black beetles started appearing, usually on the floor, in June, and have occurred in varying numbers since then. This mystery species was identified for us by Caroline Uff of the National Trust. Apparently, they occur world-wide and may found in bird and mammal nests and roosts,

grain and food stores and poultry housing. They are attracted to light and this may have brought them to our houses. The larvae may be used to feed pet reptiles and have indeed been sold as food for humans too. Any takers? Tom Wall

A Talk by John Scrace Wednesday 28 November, 7.30 pm Lvdburv North Village Hall

With the growing volume of plants being imported into the UK and climate change allowing more pests to become established here, this is going to be an ongoing story.

Because Openreach have installed Fibre to the Premises (FTTP) in this area, those premises within reach of the network should be able to order broadband packages with download speeds of up to 300mbps. However, not all Internet Service Providers (ISPs) currently offer the service. so parishioners might not be informed by their ISP that it is available and may need to consider changing providers.

The Maternal Mental Health Alliance has published data that shows that the level of specialist support given to Shropshire women and their families is 'extremely basic' and 'falls short of national standards'. Extended GP Appointments

Local GP practices are working together to offer patients more access to appointments, in the early evenings and weekends, from Monday 1 October. They will work together in a network of 'hubs' to provide this service. The 'hubs' will take turns to provide the Extended Access appointments to patients. This means patients could be offered an appointment at their own surgery or at a nearby practice in the local area. Patients will be advised about appointment location at time of booking, enabling them to make an informed choice about where and when they access care. The pre-bookable appointments will be available -

- Weekday evenings (Monday to Friday) 6.30pm 8pm (at a local area hub)
- Saturdays 8am 1pm (at a local area hub)
- **Sundays and Bank Holidays** 8.30am 12.30pm (at a site in central Shrewsbury) To book an appointment contact your practice during normal opening hours.
