Reminiscences of a Hard Winter

p to twenty feet of snow, severe drifting, villages cut off. No don't panic, I'm not giving you the long term weather forecast, I'm talking about the winter of 1947.

Harry Collins, Chairman of the Parish Council, remembers that winter well. At the time he was a sheep farmer living at Fold Farm in Clunton, where he still lives.

"It was terrible weather. I don't think that anyone in living memory had seen weather like that before. We were lucky though because although our sheep were at the top of the hill we had hay ricks and they had food but some farmers weren't so lucky and they lost their stock because they couldn't get to them. It also didn't help because the previous summer had been very wet and there were some farmers who hadn't managed to get the hay in."

I asked Harry how he managed to get to check that his animals were all right.

"'We didn't have tractors so we'd get on one of the cart horses and they'd keep going, there was no way you could walk, the snow was too deep." Ron Wellings of Clunbury also remembers that winter. He was twelve and living in Clungunford.

"I used to take the coal hammer down to the River Clun and break the ice so that I could scoop water out of the river so that my Mother could do the washing. We did have a pump at the back of the house but that gave us little water because it was frozen but despite the weather the school bus managed to get through, except for one day when we were a bit naughty. The snow drifts were alongside the road and a group of us decided to see if we could move them. We did but we piled the snow up on the road and poor Miss Small. the driver, couldn't get the bus through. We didn't do it again though."

I asked both Harry and Ron how they thought families survived during that winter. They both replied, self sufficiency. People didn't rely on supermarkets in those days they made and grew a lot of their own food and it tasted so much better than food does today. Also we accepted our lot, didn't worry and all pulled together but most of all – we survived.

Parish Council Notes

Iunbury Parish Council met on January 21st. The full minutes of the meeting will appear on the parish website when they are available. Vice-Chairman John Croxton reported that the Local Joint Committee had approved a number of grants including £345 for Clunbury Under 5s to run Village Street Dancers sessions after school on Tuesdays culminating in an end of term Song and Dance Concert for the village. A small amount of this year's grant money remains unallocated so get your applications in quickly. John also reported that the new sewage treatment plant at Clunbury was not working as there is no power on site. Tankers will remove the effluent until such time as an electrical supply is installed. Cllr. John Hoskins requested the Clerk to contact Shropshire Council regarding flooding. He also proposed that the PC should agree how to tackle issues raised in the Parish Plan and offered to produce a list of actions for the next meeting. After some discussion on finance it was agreed to maintain the Parish Precept at £3,000. The next meeting will be on 25th March at 8.00pm in Clunbury VH.

From the Archives

The following extract is taken from a Clunbury WI competition entry written in 1980:

"A sign-post at Little Brampton crossroads, of unusual design in cast iron, is said to have been erected by Clive of India. It was moved a few yards towards the farm when mains water was brought to Clunbury in 1960. At that time it was partially encased in concrete to preserve the structure. The plaque beneath the sign-post reads:

THIS DIRECTION PILLAR WAS ERECTED IN 1800 BY THE LATE LORD CLIVE, AFTERWARDS CREATED 1st EARL OF POWIS, AND WAS TAKEN DOWN, REMOVED AND RENOVATED DURING THE ROAD IMPROVEMENTS OF 1929."
