However the Gypsy encampment where the sculptor lived had become so attached to their 'George' that they were very reluctant to hand him back. But Mr & Mrs Fletcher liked him too - and they had paid for him! So eventually they took 'George' back to their smallholding.

He lived there quite happily for some time, but recently they decided to downsize and move to Yorkshire, making 'George' homeless.

Regretfully, they entered George as a lot in the next farm sale. The news reached Kempton and the new owners of the forge, Lyn and Gary, thought that, if they could afford it, they would love to see the vestiges of the old forge back where they belonged, albeit in a different guise and for a different purpose. So, at the end of August, they went, with some trepidation, to the sale. There was another bidder, but after a few minutes of nail-biting head to head, Gary was able to seal the deal, albeit at his 'top whack' price.



George now cuts a fine figure in the yard of the Old Forge. Mr and Mrs Fletcher didn't recoup their outlay, but are delighted to know that their George has gone back to his birthplace. So are we! Welcome home 'George', the farmer and *Bironic Man*.

Parish Council Meeting Report 18 September 2014

All councillors present + Shropshire Cllr Hartin

Parish Plan Review: Due to delays in the summer, the questionnaire is not quite finalised, but should be soon. The Clerk advised the councillors that there was some money left over from the first Parish Plan, on top of the £1,000 grant allocated by the Council this year.

Website: The Parish Council uses the Parish Post Website: www.theparishpost.org.uk.

Review of Standing Orders/Financial Regulations: the Clerk is still working these out, with a view to distributing the details to councillors.

Parish Land at the Black Hill: An outing to the Black Hill will take place on Sunday 12 October at 2.30pm. Meet at Fiddler's Elbow.

Clunton Pub Business Rates: No new development. More enquiries needed.

Ashbeds right of way: An objection to Shropshire Council's proposition to (re)-establish the right of way has been raised. The Chairman expressed the opinion that the matter was now in the hands of Shropshire Council, and there probably would be another enquiry. Cllr S Jones suggested that the Parish Council should take a view on it. The Chair asked the Clerk to find out the legal position from the Council.

Burial Ground: The owner of the property with the contested right of way has put the property on the market. It is essential that the Parish Council has sight of the deeds to know the legal position of the Parish Council. Cllr S Jones and the Clerk will go and have a look at the deeds in the County Archives.

South West Shropshire Joint Committee (replacing LJC): Cllr Hartin explained that, as there is no more funding from Shropshire Council, funds

will have to be generated from local businesses, parish councils, etc. Small grants will then be distributed as before. There will be a meeting on 8 October, at Clun Memorial Hall, when the situation regarding A&E moving to Telford will be discussed.

Mobile phone reception is very poor (or non-existent) in our area, yet it can be of vital importance for safety issues (eg lone workers). Petitions have been drawn up to put pressure on mobile phone companies. Alternatives to BT are being explored.

In an effort to save money Shropshire Council has made 700 redundancies, but still needs another 1,000. Council offices in some areas have been closed. Ludlow's will also go, although some services may be obtainable from some points in the town (such as the library). Clun Fire Station will be retained.

Planning: One dwelling and access at Willow Field in Clunton: no objection. Single storey garden room at Halcyon Cottage, Kempton: no objection. For information: Conservatory at Hurst Croft: application for lawful development certificate.

Planning consent granted: Extension to dwelling in Clunton and to Church House, Clunbury.

Mossy Lane, Clunbury: Planning application withdrawn, house for sale.

SAMDev consultation: Cllr Hartin explained that the Council now have a 5-year supply of land and the consultation is progressing.

Place Plan Annual Review: 'Place Plans are aimed at ensuring the delivery of sustainable places in Shropshire'. They are drawn up by Shropshire Council to establish the needs of communities in terms of services, transport, natural environment, etc. They provide a basis for development decisions and negotiations with developers. The Clerk is to ask Matthew

Mead to come and explain more fully the role of Place Plans. **Roads:** No problems reported. An interactive sign in Twitchen and a mirror at Three Ashes have been put on Shropshire Council's list and will be implemented when funds are available. The Clunton exit hazard has not been resolved. Cllr Hill wondered if a mirror would help. He suggested that, if the new building in Clunton brought some 'CIL money' in to the Council, it could be used for this purpose.

The question of the Purslow crossroads was raised. Coming from the Kempton direction, the visibility to the left is still very poor. The works were interrupted, waiting for the pole to be moved. Nothing has happened since. The Clerk is to enquire when the works might be resumed.

A member of the public pointed out the need for repair of Dark Lane at Cwm, an ancient ridgeway which has been eroded and damaged to the point of being unsafe. The Clerk is to write to Shropshire Council on this subject.

Finance: Community A/c: £2,383.27; Business Saver: £6,889.60 (including the £1,000 grant for the Parish Plan Review). Expenses: Clerk's salary for July & August: £304.16; Shropshire Council election money: £100; npower: £80.01.

AOB: the Clerk is to request a talk from the Ambulance Service.

Next meeting: 13 November at Clunton Village Hall, 8pm.

The backbone of her half acre garden contains broad-leaved evergreens in a scheme designed for all year interest. In 1995 the Aucubas (Japanese Laurels) were granted National Collection status and through extensive research in Japan Linda has become an expert of international repute with a particular interest in plant conservation. Her own garden in Stourbridge is also described as a family one, including fruit, vegetables and bantams!

Linda's talk takes place on Wednesday 22 October at 7.30pm in Lydbury North Village Hall. It is free to members of South West Shropshire Gardening Club; visitors are also welcome at £3 per person including refreshments.
