

An Interview With Peter Hutchinson

(founder of the Clunbury Hill Run)

Purslow Show fell victim to the bad weather this summer and with it the Clunbury Hill Run, in its 21st year. For a 'newie' like me, it was interesting to discover how it came about, hence the quiet and modest Peter Hutchinson had his arm twisted to come and talk to me!



Peter was born in Sheffield and as a youngster was a keen runner himself, in the challenging countryside that lies on the east side of the Pennines. He regularly went to help out on a relative's farm in the Cotswolds and it was during one of these stays that he was exploring a nearby forest and came across some men felling, and Peter recalls, "That was it! I knew then that was what I wanted to do!"

However, National Service beckoned and during his time in the RAF he continued his running, winning a gold medal in a cross country event. Later, a little parental pressure steered him towards a different career, and for some months, Peter worked as a Customs and Excise Officer but he soon realised this wasn't the life for him and he left to pursue his dream of a career in forestry, gaining a position with the Forestry Commission, which meant a move to the north Lake District.

In 1965, Peter discovered his forest workers had entered him for the 7 mile

Fell Run at the Ennerdale Show but he smiles ruefully when I ask how he did. "Well, the trouble was, I called in to the pub on the way there, so I ran dismally!"

Peter recalls how all the shows in that area would hold a Fell Run, with the start and finish in the showground.

A forester's life later, after many positions between Herefordshire and Scotland, Peter and his wife Barbara ended up in Clunbury. In 1991, when Ron Mold, one of the co-founders of Purslow Sports, said he was looking to extend the scope of the events and invited suggestions, Peter sought him out (in the Beer tent!) and told him of his ideas for a Hill Run.

The Committee approached Mr. Whitehead, who was very enthusiastic and encouraging, and Peter was told, "If you set it up, we'll give it a go!"

The inaugural event took place in 1992 and there were 22 runners. "The Ludlow Runners always gave us great support, providing a good number of entrants of a high standard," Peter recalls, "and I think what made the race so special was the fact you could view the runners for such a large part of the course. The winning time was 23 minutes and Mr. Whitehead donated medals and trophies presented the Edward Whitehead Memorial Trophy to the overall winner."

Over the years, the entrants have increased to over 50 (ranging from children to people in their 70's) and the winning time has decreased to a little over 20 minutes. "We have always been blessed with good weather," Peter said, "until this year! I have thoroughly enjoyed my association with the Hill Run, though it does cause me a few days of apprehension beforehand! We've witnessed some remarkable runs and we're very lucky to have had great support from many running clubs."

Thank you, Peter, and hopefully your vision can continue for many years to come.

Pretty Invasive Plant

Darry Powderhill who lives on Clunbury Hill contacted us about the Himalayan balsam he has found growing in his garden which is some distance from the river where it grows abundance. This invasive non-native species is the tallest annual plant in Britain growing up to 3m high. The characteristic purplish-pink slipper appear shaped flowers in plants Himalayan balsam suppress native species and leave river banks liable to erosion when the plants die back in autumn. Control measures should aim to prevent flowering and are best carried out before June. Chemical control is



effective but approval must be obtained from the Environment Agency before using this near water. Cutting, strimming or pulling on a

regular basis for about three years will also be effective. No statutory body has responsibility for controlling or eradicating this pest, responsibility lies with the landowner.

Japanese Knotweed is another foreign invader that is at large in the Parish but, fortunately, not on the same scale as the balsam. Japanese knotweed can damage buildings and cause problems with buying, selling and obtaining mortgages on properties where it is present.

Parish Council Meeting Notes

13 September in Clunbury Village Hall.

Ashbeds: The situation is unchanged. Mr Sweetman is hopeful that a meeting, in a week's time, at Shrewsbury Shirehall will clarify the matter.

Site Housing Development Plans (SAMDev): No more information at present. There is to be a meeting on Friday 21 September with other parishes, to discuss any common ground.

Planning: An application has been received for the removal of agricultural occupancy restriction on two dwellings at Cwm Farm, Clunton. This was discussed and the Parish Council decision will be sent to County.

Two applications have been received: a 2-storey extension at Cuckoo's Corner and a garage at Wimberry Cottage, Clunbury. It has been observed that, in the case of the latter, the height of the garage would take light off another property and that there might be some drainage problems.

Two applications have been granted: a tennis court at Purslow Hall and an extension at The Gardens, Clunbury.

Roads: It was suggested that for energy and cost savings, the street lights in Clunton could be turned off from, say, midnight until 6 or 7 am. One or two lights, in strategic position could perhaps be left on if it was felt necessary. The councillors would welcome the opinion of Clunton residents on the matter.

BOAT1 at Cwm Lane Cottage: 4x4 vehicles are damaging this lane.

Overgrown hedge at Mallow Cottage: Although the hedge has been lightly trimmed, it has grown again and is still an impediment to traffic, particularly with lorries being pushed to the middle of the lane and leaving little room for other vehicles to pass. It was suggested that Shropshire Council be contacted to assess the situation,

Correspondence: The accounts were read (Community a/c: £2,036.31;

Business a/c: £3,710.18; Sport & Leisure a/c: £3,229.63). It was decided that the £50 donation for the First responders (decided on at the last meeting) should come out of Sports and Leisure account. Bills to be paid: Clerk's salary for July and August: £240; PAYE: £60; Clunton Village Hall: £6.25.

AOB: The road closure at Purslow is creating chaos: the signs do not explain properly the alternative routes, particularly for lorries which are restricted in their choice of route by bridges. There should be signs in Craven Arms to divert HGVs. The Highway Department is to be contacted to sort the situation immediately.

The date for the Parish Council elections has been fixed: 2 May 2013. The present Parish Council is hopeful that many candidates will come forward and would like to hear from anyone interested in standing.

There is to be a replacement 'Clunbury' village sign on the Twitchen road.

The spreading of Himalayan Balsam in the valley is a matter of concern. Clr Hill will look into current recommendations on how to deal with the problem.
