Future Fit

Our organisation, Shropshire Defend Our NHS, has produced a report *Future Fit:*

Briefing Notes'. The document is a critical indepth review of the Future Fit programme, which is the Royal Shrewsbury Hospital RIP?

patients who will be discharged earlier from Telford's Princess Royal Hospital, there is currently a

blueprint for NHS hospital services in the county, drawn up by the Clinical Commissioning Groups in Shropshire, and Telford and Wrekin. Our concerns include the following:

- that the inevitable outcome of the Future Fit programme will be the closure of the A&E and acute hospital at Shrewsbury.
- that this will leave a single overburdened A&E and hospital at Telford, as well as leading to dangerously long journey times for many of us in a medical emergency.
- that rural urgent care centres, once a given, have now been designated as optional extras; effectively 'kicked into touch', with no decisions to be taken until after consultation on hospital closure has finished. This is a huge blow for rural areas.
- that, now the funding arrangements for Future Fit have been fully revealed,

strategy of closing community hospital beds to save money.

the budget available to community services, expected to pick up 30% of

activity from hospitals, is pitiful and

that, although Future Fit is predicated

on community hospital beds taking

totally inadequate.

Future Fit is a failing programme. It is ill-conceived and based essentially on cost-cutting at the expense of patient care. The risks to patients are huge. We believe Future Fit must be stopped.

Our report is a public document. It is, of necessity, an in-depth report but the salient points are given in the three-page Executive Summary at the beginning.

Another Threat to our NHS? Hips and Knees in Danger

C hropshire NHS wants to reduce the Onumber of hip and knee replacement operations - and make patients wait longer for surgery. The rate of operations in the county is 'higher than the national average' and is expected to grow even more because of Shropshire's aging according to Shropshire population. Clinical Commissioning Group. who quietly shoehorned six 'public and patient listening workshops' into a three-week period at the end of August, with in some cases, less than a week's notice. Not surprisingly attendance at the meetings was very low. Similarly an online and paper-based survey of opinion between August 10 and September 2 produced only 61 returns. (Detailed results can be www.shropshireccg.nhs.uk found on under Get Involved then Orthopaedic Surgery.)

This plan to cut this vital surgery that transforms lives is being presented as a 'proactive approach to osteoarthritis' to reverse the 'ever increasing trend for Povey from surgery'. Dr Julian Shropshire CCG, said in a press release that this change will be 'balanced and safetv checked' with support from other services alongside increasing resources to prevent the 'complications' of osteoarthritis', but did not give any details of what the other services or resources might be. He thinks that better pain and weight management and physiotherapy will be enough to avoid or delay operations for many patients and he also wants to raise the threshold for surgery so that fewer will gualify under a new points system.

Shropshire Council's Health and Social Care Scrutiny Committee backed the plan in July, and now the CCG have recommended that the new plan is approved. Although the time frame for asking for patient and public opinion has closed, any resident who feels strongly about this issue should write or email Dr Povey immediately to register their opinion or ask for further and wider consultation before any further steps or a final decision is taken

Our views on how the local NHS spends our money on the future of our healthcare should be heard. So if - like most people in Shropshire - you missed 'listening workshops' the and the surveys, your views on this plan are still urgently needed.



Parish Council Meeting 10 Sept.

Six councillors present + two members of the public. Apologies received from Cllrs Hill, Hoskins and M Jones. There were no declarations of interest.

Matters Arising from the Minutes

Parish Land on Black Hill: Cllrs Croxton and Morgan will arrange a meeting with Annie Sutton who has a box of historical papers regarding this. Cllr Bailey reported that the accounts for the parish charity are being sorted and that the trustees hope to meet sometime in the next six weeks. It was felt that the papers held by the trustees refer to the green land. The clerk will attend this meeting.

AED Kempton: A member of the public who is a First Responder tested the box and the code did not work. She will report it to Cliff Medlicott, Co-ordinator in Shrewsbury.

Ridgeway BOAT at The Cwm: Nothing to report at present. Cllr S Jones will follow this up with Mrs Griffiths who was going to contact Shropshire Council.

Bridleway at Ashbeds: There is to be a

Public Enquiry in Clunbury VH, 10am, Tuesday 22 September.

Clunton Burial Ground: The contractor has cleared the path. A machine will be needed to clear the lane. Cllrs Davies & M Jones will organise this. The new owner of the property is now in residence.

Parish Plan Review: Data is now being analysed. As yet, no date has been set for publication. The volunteer sheets have been passed to relevant bodies.

Planning: Cllr S Jones has investigated the site of a static caravan at Cwm Bydd and could see no problems. The clerk has sent in a response in support. It was noted that planning permission for chicken sheds at Walcot Farm had been approved by Shropshire Council.

South West Shropshire LJC: NHS Future Fit Programme: Cllrs S Jones Harding have been attending and meetings and voiced grave concerns as there is now no funding for the Programme. Services in Shropshire will be cut drastically and operations will be reduced, particularly mentioned are hip and knee replacements. Shropshire Council has said the county 'has a rising older population and they are putting unsustainable demands on the services'. Social Care has been re-organised but funding is not known yet. One local Parish Council already making is enquiries about the situation. It was agreed that the clerk would contact other Parish Councils in the area expressing these concerns with a view to holding a joint meeting regarding the way forward. This may be a public meeting with MPs and Shropshire Councillors invited.

Roads: *Road Conditions and Street lamp failures*: All street lamps are working. Some pot holes have been skimmed over. Cllr Morgan will identify holes still not done on the Blackhill to Obley Road.

Purslow Cross Roads: Grass has been cut twice since the last meeting and visibility is better. The pole has not been

removed and the Severn Trent signs are still in situ. Cllr Croxton will continue to mention these matters to county officers at every opportunity.

Speed of traffic in Clunton: The clerk, councillors and a member of the public met with Glvn Shaw from the County in Clunton. He has agreed to arrange 'Concealed Entrances' signs at the Craven Arms end of the village and for a mirror to be placed by The Crown. He advised the Councillors to contact the Safer Roads Partnership expressing our concerns about speeding and asking if the village could be considered as 'a place of community concern'. If this is agreed, and after consultation with the police, we may be able to have speed camera warning signs up, meaning that there could be mobile speed cameras at any time

Clunton Coppice passing places: Cllr S Jones confirmed that the Wildlife Trust had stated that not a lot can be done until Autumn.

Twitchen: Cllr Bailey reported that the interactive sign and mirrors requested will be installed.

Increased Theft of Land Rover Defenders

t has been identified that in recent months, the WEST MERCIA policing areas have experienced a marked increase in the number of attempted thefts and thefts of Land Rover Defenders - since the start of the 2015.



In the vast majority of these cases offenders have stolen the vehicles without keys. This is likely due to the lower levels of security offered by the model. However, research has shown that there are devices that allow the immobiliser to be circumvented in a matter of seconds (one of which is a preprogrammed key and small block device - similar to the head of a SCART lead that can be plugged into an internal port under the driver's seat).

To date, very few of these vehicles have been recovered - they may be broken down for parts (although this isn't confirmed).

If you see anything or anyone acting suspiciously around your area please report it by calling 101.
