Operation Christmas Child 2011

t may seem a little early to be thinking of Christmas – but I already have the



supplies of leaflets and posters to start off the Box Shoe campaign which is organised every year by Samaritan's Purse. an international Christian relief and development

organisation. In 2010, 1.12 million shoeboxes from the UK, packed with gifts, were distributed to disadvantaged children in 14 countries around the world, including 12,084 boxes from the Hereford warehouse bound for Ukraine and Bosnia. In 2011, our boxes will be going to Belarus, a country that was badly affected by the Chernobyl nuclear disaster.

I went to a meeting to listen to Nicolai Balbutski, who is the Distribution Coordinator in Belarus. He showed us videos and photographs of the shoeboxes arriving in his country in deep snow. Many of the boxes were loaded onto sledges to reach their destination. We watched a video of some of the children receiving them and he told us that, for most, it will be the only gift they receive and they are opened with so much excitement and joy. Hats and scarves, toys, pens and pencils, and even soap and toothbrushes bring a huge smile to their faces.

This year we are encouraging an Olympic theme and suggestions for gifts to put in your box include sports items such as balls, skipping ropes, baseball hats etc. Please will you help us to pack more boxes this year. Even if you feel you cannot pack a whole box yourself, you can give just a few items. If you can only let me have empty shoeboxes, that would be helpful – we need as many as we can find. Let us see if we can break all records this year and make 2011 a Christmas full of joy, reminding children in need that they have not been forgotten.
