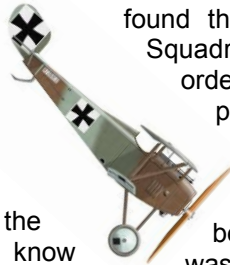

The Exhibition: Remembering The Great War in Clunbury and Clunton

The exhibition opened in St. Swithin's with a very moving service and was then moved to St. Mary's Clunton where a short vigil was held on the 4 August.

Col. Raymond Savill, who for many years took the Remembrance Day services at the Purslow Memorial and Clunbury Church, often commented on the lack of information about those named on the memorials. Efforts had been made to find out something about the men but with no success. The advent of internet records, along with my experience researching family history, gave me hope that in 2014 – when we would be commemorating the start of World War One – these new searches would be more successful. So it has proved and the exhibition held in St Swithin's Clunbury and then in St Mary's Clunton was well attended.

I have been able to identify all the men (save two) and we now know something of their backgrounds, families, employment, military service and finally their place of death and where they are commemorated. In all there are twenty-seven men named on the memorials but I now have information on other men who were not commemorated at the time but who had a definite, long standing connection with Clunbury or the surrounding area. In response to my requests in local journals and as word got out, families who still live in the area came forward with more information and even photographs and letters. All the men were interesting to research but two who were associated with Little Brampton will stand as examples of the lives I have explored.



Private Charles Job Lewis was born at The Wheelwright's, Little Brampton, the son of John and Kate Sarah Lewis. I was given copies of letters Charles wrote home and photographs of him and his family. Charles died from an abscess on his head, which was the result of an untreated scratch from a piece of metal in his trench. In the days before antibiotics, this proved fatal. Charles was a bellringer at St Swithin's Church, Clunbury and is further commemorated on the bell ringers' roll of honour in St Paul's Cathedral and in All Saints, Hereford. His fellow soldiers spoke very well of him in diaries and letters.

Second Lieutenant Bevan Carleton Smith was very difficult to track down. Finally, after searching many combinations of his name, my husband found that he was a member of 100 Squadron, RAF. In 1919 he was

ordered to fly a captured German plane for evaluation. The plane crashed and Bevan died from his burns six days later. The plane was believed to have been sabotaged. Although he was born in Didsbury, Lancashire, his connection with Clunbury was through his mother's family. Bevan's mother, Adelaide, was the daughter of the Hamar family who lived at Little Brampton Farm. Bevan's sisters, Dorothy and Kathleen Mary are buried in St. Swithin's churchyard.

There are still two names that I have been unable to further identify - J Davies and J Morris. If you have any suggestions as to who these men might be, I would be very grateful if you would let me know.

All the information will be retained for the time being in St Swithin's, Clunbury but eventually I am hopeful that the information will be stored at Shropshire Archives, Shrewsbury.

Tom's 'Singular Stiperstones'

Tom Wall has been a regular contributor to the 'Parish Post' since its launch, so I thought the recent publication of his book 'The Singular



Stiperstones: landscape, reminiscence, literature and wildlife', was a good excuse to find out more about him.

Tom was born in Hertfordshire where he developed an interest in wildlife alongside his father, a keen bird watcher; but when it came to choosing a university course Tom went to Bristol to study Politics and History because "I had a very good history teacher and I liked writing essays".

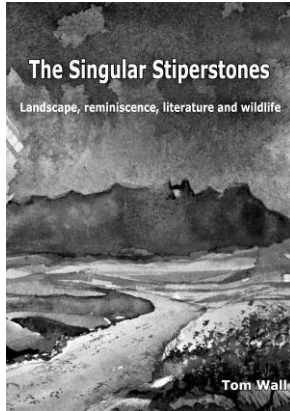
Before university he was an assistant teacher in a prep school and on a class visit to France he encountered a young French primary school teacher named Gisèle - he was smitten! He interrupted his university studies to go and live in France for a year and his persistence paid off as Gisèle agreed to follow him back to the UK and they were married.

After completing his degree, his interest in birds overcame politics and history and he found a job, as part of the ground staff, with the Wildfowl Trust at Slimbridge, and later, County Durham. His career path was now set. Although he had no formal scientific qualifications, he had, as he said, "learned on the job" and he became Warden of Rostherne Mere National Nature Reserve in Cheshire where he stayed for ten years.

In 1986 Tom was appointed Site Manager of the Stiperstones and Downton Gorge National Nature Reserves and he, Gisèle and their daughter Bryonie moved to Kempton. Despite the landowners at Downton Gorge originally wanting to keep the public out, Tom was able to persuade them to allow guided walks there. I'm sure

I'm not the only reader who will remember being part of a group which was entranced by the amazing landscape of the gorge and the description of its birds and flora as we were led along the narrow paths by Tom.

The Stiperstones however was the site of Tom's major project, which became known as 'Back to Purple'. His idea was to fell the conifers that shrouded parts of the hill, clear away the brash and allow the native species - heather and bilberry (or wimberry, winberry, whinberry - locals can have a good barney over this!) to regenerate. Nature was given a helping hand, as Lottery Funding meant heather seed could be broadcast from helicopters, and willing volunteers planted heather and bilberry plugs. Anyone who has enjoyed the sight of the heather in full purple bloom must applaud his achievement.



Tom started thinking of writing a book about the Stiperstones in 2000 and the project finally reached fruition this year. He used the recorded reminiscences of local people published previously in 'Never on a Sunday' and 'Once upon a hill', as well as searching for new material and photographs in Shropshire Archives.

Tom and Gisèle decided on self-publication. Gisèle worked on enhancing the old photographs and did the layout on the computer (a job for which she was eminently suited as this is what she does every month to produce your 'Parish Post!') and this enterprising couple then had 750 copies printed.

Anyone interested in local history and the environment will find this book fascinating. You can get a copy, price £18 directly from Tom (phone 660561 and he promises personal delivery locally) or they are on sale at local bookshops, the Discovery Centre, Craven Arms or The Bog Visitor Centre, Stiperstones.

A Cautionary Tale!!

Part 1 - A Grisly Discovery

A grim sight awaited some members of Clunbury Village Hall Committee when they opened up the hall to set up for the Summer Lunch.

Although Mr Brown did make the sensible remark, "Well, it's a pity they didn't realise they could have got out of the fire door!"

In the light of this, the local constabulary have advised the

Committee that they need to update their Risk Assessment, and a notice entitled,
