Too Many Chickens Come Home to Roost?

Plans for more broiler chicken production in our region are in doubt after



a leaked letter dated 5 July 2018 from Avara Foods (chicken processors) of Hereford to their 'Growers' stated: "There is already more poultry production in the Herefordshire area than is required for the Hereford factory". Both Clungunford and Clunbury Parish Councils have recently objected to planning applications for new broiler units. Neither application has received final approval and there is now further reason for Shropshire Council to reject them.

NHS Future Fit Meeting

Twenty-five people attended the meeting in Clunbury Village Hall when Simon Freeman from the Clinical Commissioning Group outlined the two options the Group are proposing. Their preferred option is to site Emergency Care at the Royal Shrewsbury Hospital with Planned Care taking place at the Princess Royal Hospital in Telford. The other option is the reverse of this. He faced many questions from the floor particularly regarding the increased distance local people would have to travel to receive planned care. The problem of ambulance response times was also raised but Mr Freeman said this was outside the remit of Future Fit and that people should lobby their MP about it.

Mr Freeman left the meeting as he was not willing to enter into debate with the other speaker, Gill George, of the Defend our NHS Group. She spoke against both proposed options, urging people to reject them in the survey. Her contention is that the funding available would be better spent on improving care in the community and local hospitals.

Crayfish on Our Doorstep

Clunton Brook, which having risen near Stepleknoll runs down eventually to the Clun passing close to the Crown Inn, has proved the best watercourse for Crayfish amongst the six surveyed so far in the Clun catchment. Supervised by a specialist licensed by Natural England, eight volunteers undertook an extensive search on 17 August finding adults and good numbers of juveniles, as well as other invertebrates, such as Stonefly and Mayfly nymphs and the little fish known as the Bullhead or Miller's Thumb. An Otter had left evidence from its opposite end and there were damselfly nymphs too. By contrast, while similar freshwater life was found on the Clun, no Crayfish were found there.

The surveys are organised by the Shropshire Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty with support from its Conservation Fund, WREN and the Shropshire Ecological Data Network. The surveys are part of a concerted effort by the Marches Crayfish Partnership to establish for the first time the distribution in the region of this small, lobster-like crustacean, known officially as the White-clawed Crayfish. Adults are just 4 to 10cm long and have in many areas been displaced by the rather larger American Signal Crayfish introduced in the 1970s. The Signals carry the so-called 'crayfish plague', a fungus to which they are resistant; it is however fatal to the long-established White-clawed Crayfish which is struggling in the face of this threat and pollution. Have you found crayfish on local streams, recently, or in the past? If so, please let me or the Parish Post know.

We've applied to the Heritage Lottery Fund for funding to restore the fabric of the building but to safeguard its future, it needs to be sustainable. We see a role for the building as a community exhibition space, as a meeting venue for local groups and as interpretation centre explaining the role of the railway in the history of the town. To do this we want to install electricity, mains water and drainage and provide an accessible toilet. HLF funds won't cover all of this. Volunteering is already making a significant contribution and the Railway Society has agreed to make a substantial sum available but we'll need more to realise the dream.

We want to raise at least £10,000, so we're asking for donations, no matter how small, towards the successful completion of this project. Everything we receive will be ring-fenced and, in the event of the project not proceeding, can be returned to donors.

There will be two open days: 8 (2-4pm) and 9 (11am-6pm) September at the Weighbridge, next to the Cattle Market, Bishop's Castle. All welcome.
