Anything Goes!

A fter another wonderful performance by the 'Dance Band' *Anything Goes* on the occasion of the Burns' Night, in Kempton Village Hall, we tried to find out a bit more about music, in and around the parish. We met at John and Janet Phillips's house (easily recognised by the CND flag floating in the wind on the road to Bishop's Castle).

John and Janet have lived in the parish for 15 years (John taught music at Ludlow School and Janet, psychologist and teacher, was our Green candidate at the last



general election). Both started music when they were very young. In fact, John started the piano at the age of 4, and accompanied his mother, who was a concert cellist, but he took to the trombone later on, finding it a more exciting instrument to play. He says he only started playing seriously when he joined *Anything Goes* and that he is 'still learning'.

Janet played the clarinet at school and, later, the saxophone (soprano, tenor and alto); she even took up the baroque lute (an



instrument with 24 strings - how long does it take to tune, Janet?), thinking it would be quieter for the neighbours, but found it a lonely experience: not many players of the lute around! John has been conducting the *Bishop's Castle Orchestra* for a number of years and both John and Janet joined the band *Anything Goes* about 3 years ago.

John Franklin, the leader, started the band in 2006 soon after coming to Bishop's Castle. He had been playing the trumpet since his school days, and been in amateur



bands all his life. He soon found other like-minded musicians to join him; after one practice they played at an Amnesty International Concert in Bishop's Castle.

After a brainstorming session, the group came up with the name: Anything Goes. How apt given the mixture of instruments (brass, wind, percussion, double bass, guitar, keyboards; they even once had a lady playing a trombone part on the cello) and in view of the Cole Porter song Anything Goes with which they start their performances. The band specialises in 1920s and 1930s music and "a bit of Glenn Miller"; they have 100 numbers in their repertoire. The band meets once a week in the Church Barn. Bishop's Castle, and play at a number of such as Purslow Show. venues Midsummer Rejoicing, Bishop's Castle Carnival, and the Michaelmas Fair. They have now played twice in Kempton Village Hall, to the great delight of the audience. They are happy to perform inside or in the open air! Last year, they took part in three performances (in Craven Arms, Bishop's Castle, and Continued overleaf

Knighton) that were specifically for children. Both they and the children had a great time! They aim to play at local venues and/ or for charity about 8 or 9 times a year and do sometimes take private bookings. They love playing music, any sort of music. "I prefer playing to listening" says John Phillips.

The Bishop's Castle Orchestra and Anything Goes often appear at the same venues. The Orchestra is preparing for a concert in Lydbury North Village Hall, on 12 March. in aid of Cancer Research (admission free. but there will be a donations box). Together, they are planning an Old Time Music Hall and are looking for performers: jugglers, acrobats, fire-eaters, anyone with some sort of circus skill. Any offers? Can You Help Pinpoint Drainage **Outfalls in the Clun Catchment?**

he Shropshire Hills AONB Partnership has received funding from WREN and the Environment Agency to map highway gully pots and outfalls in the Clun Catchment. Under our roads are many kilometres of drainage networks. These efficiently feed excess water which carries salt, sediments and nutrients into our rivers. By mapping the gully pots and outfalls we will have а better understanding of what is entering our rivers and where. and how this contributes to local flooding issues. We are focusing on two areas, the lower Clun and Kemp Valley. With an estimated 2,000 + gully pots this is a huge task! Aston-on-Clun Craft and Collectables Market has been running successfully for nearly a year now. Andra Tongue from Aston and Judith Payling from Clunbury got together after meeting at another market and deciding that between them they could organise a monthly market which would attract a broad range of local craftspeople and antique sellers. They were keen to promote a community venue which would



enable local people to showcase their skills and provide a focus for people to get together once a month. The market has proved to be a venue for people from near and far seeking unusual gifts and items for their home. The traders have been very positive about their experience of working with the market organisers and there is a waiting list of people wishing to become part of the Aston-on-Clun Market.

The Market Café initiative has been a great success and Judy Cornhill has treated us all to many and varied tempting cakes and delicious cheese scones! There have been demonstrations at most markets and these have included furniture painting, needlefelting, papercraft, polymer clay modelling, upholstery techniques and glass bead making: more are planned for the coming year.



Showing Soon... in a Wood Near You

wo of the most delicately beautiful of spring flowers will soon be in bloom in a wood near you. However, although local wildflower enthusiasts John have Clavfield and Dave Simpson trawled their memory banks, they can't come up with anv verv definite recommendations as to where to see both of them at their best. They point out that Wood-sorrel is widespread, whilst mentioning Clunton Coppice as probably



the most r e l i a b l e location at which to see the plant in flower. Look out for the soft green

of their trefoil, clover-like leaves and their delicate white petals veined with lilac. Apparently an old Shropshire name is 'Cuckoo's sour' relating both to springtime and to the lemony flavour of the leaves – try them in a cream-cheese sandwich or tossed in a salad, but don't over-do it, the flavour is that of oxalic acid and they are slightly toxic if eaten in quantity.

The star-shaped white flowers of Wood Anemone are often flushed pink on the underside. They are seen at their best in Saturday 5 March, 7.30pm Chapel Lawn Village Hall Bucknell, SY7 0BW One of the world's great guitarists,. Eduardo Niebla, presents an amazing repertoire of 'stunning flamenco jazz'. A spellbinding evening of passion, verve and fleet-fingered virtuosity.
