



Re-Dedication of the War Memorial at Purslow

If you are passing Purslow War Memorial I'm sure you will notice how spick and span it is looking.

Sculptor Jonathan Protheroe has completed the names of eight men from Bomber Command who were killed on 15 September 1943 when their plane crashed on Burrow Hill on a training flight. Members of the Clun branch of the British Legion resolved that these men should be remembered here where they died and records have been investigated, permissions sought and the project has now come to fruition.

Jonathan has carefully cleaned all the stone work, and his new work is skillfully matched with the existing names. He has been helped by volunteers Steve Arnold and Suzanne Surman who have given the railings a smart coat of black paint.

There will be a short service of re-dedication at the memorial on Sunday 26 September at 12.45, taken by the Rev Robert Payne, padre of Clun Royal British Legion.

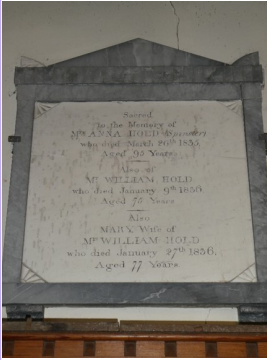

A spinster named Anna died in the parish of Clunbury on 26 March 1835 at the remarkably advanced age of 95. Her memorial (pictured left) survives in St Swithin's near the organ. She was the sister of William Hold, who died in 1808, after serving for many years as the parish clerk, His fine chest tomb (pictured right) still stands near the church door. The great mystery about Anna is that, at her death she had deposits of



as much as £9453 in the Bank of England. Part of this she bequeathed to her nephew, another William, who is also remembered in the same memorial. He survived her by less than a year, dying on 9 January 1836. They left two daughters, Sarah, who died unmarried in 1855 and is remembered in a separate inscription near Anna's, the other daughter, Mary, married Richard Wolley. It was this couple who eventually shared a part of Anna's wealth, but where did the rest go and how did Anna obtain it? She had neither a wealthy husband nor was she the Hold heir.

The wills of Anna and William yield some interesting information. The family was clearly well connected as Anna's executors were John William Barber of Pall Mall in London and a local gentleman, Richard Edwards of Little Brompton. He and his family have magnificent memorials on the chancel wall of St Swithin's. Before she lived in the village she came from Broadlands, where is that? Not all her bequests were about money. Some appear rather quaint. One favoured female relative was bequeathed six silver tablespoons, six silver dessert spoons, six silver teaspoons and two pairs of sugar tongs. Another female relative was to have all her wearing apparel, silks and silk dresses.

The terms of William's will made a few months later were soon to prove moribund because the chief beneficiary, his wife Mary, died only 18 days after him. Her death made the executors' task more difficult than it otherwise would have been. They no doubt earned the 20gns each bequeathed to them by the testator. The executors were two local gentlemen, James Edwards of the Crow, also known as the Comb, presumably now known as The Combe, who is perhaps Richard Edwards' brother and Aaron Wolley of Abcott, from the parish of Clunbury who married his son, Richard, to William's daughter, Mary on 25 May 1809. Sarah the unmarried daughter received annual rents of £50 per annum. He also left Pound Close in Clunbury to someone, where is this?

Verging on the Sweet

At my aunt's funeral, my dad's eulogy mentioned how he and his sister would



carry armfuls of Meadowsweet home for my nan, who would then spend the day wiping insects off the table. They noticed how the sweet honey smell changed to a less pleasant pong. (Meadowsweet is also called 'Courtship and Matrimony' after the sweet smell...er...going off!). I listened to that eulogy thinking I hope dad left the roots in the ground (since 1981 it's been illegal to uproot a wild plant without the landowner's permission, although it's OK to pick leaves, stem, flower and seed) and do I know my Meadowsweet from my Cow Parsley or any other umbellifer growing on the wayside? Armed with wildflower identification books, it's been a decent lockdown pastime trying to name the abundance of flowers growing in the verges. As we've lost 97% of wildflower meadows since the 1930s, the verges and hedgerows are some of the last refuges for plants which pollinators need and which make a walk much more appealing. I don't fancy the bugs on my table but I am glad that our parishes have lots of Meadowsweet, Cow Parsley, Agrimony, Betony, Bird's-foot-trefoil, vetches, Wild Rose, Cuckoo Flower, Eyebright, St John's Wort and many other native wild plants still growing down its lanes. The wildflower season is winding down but seeds, if left to fall, will start adorning our walks again next year.

Ron Wellings

A much loved character of Clunbury village, Ron Wellings passed away on Friday 6 August after a short time in Stonehouse, Bishop's Castle. He was just short of his 87th birthday and after having lived in his house in Clunbury for about 50 years, he spent the past two years at Kevindale in Broome. His funeral service took place at Clunbury church on Thursday 26 August, and his ashes will be buried with his wife of over 40 years, Glenys, in the churchyard.



Ron was born in Broome and went to school in Clungunford, and later Craven Arms. He got his first job at Newton Farm and spent the rest of his working life on local farms and lorry driving. Ron was particularly tidy, took pride in his work and was a good hedge layer. In later life he was a gardener for Joyce Brugh and others in the village and he continued at the Barn until he was over 80. Ron and his wife Glenys lived in a double decker bus behind the Engine and Tender at Broome before moving to Clunbury when the new council houses were built. Ron and Glenys had a great celebration in the village for their ruby wedding in the millennium year.

Ron had been a PCC member for many years and was a great supporter of Clunbury church and many events in the village. He was a keen member of the choir when we had one at Clunbury, and was cross-bearer for many years. He was always turned out immaculately and it was a pleasure to meet him with his happy and kind face. He was always willing to help other people and will be fondly remembered and sadly missed by many in the village.

Gardening Corner



One of the phrases you'll often hear this time of year is 'hot' garden or border. The 'hot' refers to the colour of flowers on herbaceous plants flowering at this time of year ie reds, oranges and yellow. One of the best examples of a hot border can be found at RHS Rosemoor in Devon, but closer to home Wildegoose

Nursery at Millichope has an area dedicated as a hot garden. Whilst too late for this season, it is something to think about for next year, or indeed how you want your garden to look in general next summer.

Typical examples of flowers found in hot gardens include Crocosmia Lucifer, Bishop of Llandaff dahlia, Helenium 'Moerheim Beauty' and Rudbeckia Fulgida Goldsturm - Black Eyed Susan.

Autumn is the time to lift and divide or move herbaceous plants once they've finished flowering. Consider also collecting your own seed ready for next year. If the seed heads haven't dried on the plant, cut them off and store upside down in a paper bag and leave in a warm dry place until they've dried out. So far, I've collected seeds from lupins, marigolds, and oriental poppies.

In the vegetable garden consider lifting crops to store for the winter such as potatoes, onions and shallots. Ideally this needs a dry spell so that the crop can dry on the ground before being stored inside.

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Kitchen Cupboard

This recipe by Tom Parker Bowles is from the Fortnum & Mason Afternoon Tea Recipe Book.

Courgette & Thyme Scones

Recipe

375g plain flour, plus extra for dusting; 1 tbsp baking powder; 100g unsalted butter, cubed, at room temperature; 1/2 courgette, grated; 50g grated parmesan; 100ml whole milk; 1/2 tsp salt; 2 tsp thyme leaves; 1 egg, beaten

Method

Preheat the oven to 180°C/160°C fan/gas 4. Rub the flour, baking powder and butter together in a mixing bowl until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs. Add the courgette and cheese, stir to combine, then stir in the milk, salt and thyme using a wooden spoon until a dough forms. Tip the dough on to a floured surface and use a floured rolling pin to roll it out to a thickness of 3cm. Use a 6cm dough cutter dipped in flour to cut 8 rounds from the dough, bringing it back together to a 3cm thickness until all the dough has been used up. Transfer the rounds to a baking sheet lined with baking parchment and brush the rounds with beaten egg. Bake for 15 minutes, until deep golden on top.

Eat the courgette and thyme scones warm with butter, cheese and chutney, or store in an airtight container for up to 5 days.



Blackberry and Apple Crumble

Blackberries are ripening in the hedgerows and ready for picking. They go so well with apples, so what better than a traditional blackberry and apple crumble for pudding.

Crumble

225g flour; 100g block butter; 100g sugar. Rub the butter into the flour until it resembles fine breadcrumbs. Add the sugar.

Filling

225g blackberries & 450g cooking apples. (cooked until slightly softened). Add sugar to sweeten.

Heat oven to 200°C / 400°F

Place fruit in oven fruit dish, sprinkle crumble over the top. Cook for 30-40 minutes until slightly brown.

Serve with custard, cream or ice-cream.
