'On Whinberry Hill'

Fifty children from Clunbury and Bucknell Schools visited the Black Hill on 17 October. They went there to learn more about its history and management and about the 9 acres of Parish Land lying within the forestry plantations. This land is the subject of the 'On Whinberry Hill' project, funded by the Shropshire Hills AONB and Clunbury Parish Council. The children were greeted by Sara Pearce of Forestry England who told them



about the Forestry Commission and its involvement since purchase of the Hill in 1952. Patches of Whinberry, Heather and Gorse were found, relicts of the vegetation which would once have covered the entire hill. At the Parish Land the children observed the contrast between its open aspect and the dense, dark cover of the adjacent conifer plantations. They sampled Whinberries and heard how

Clunbury School used to close when the berries were ripe as the children were away gathering them for sale. And amongst the dense cover of Bracken, they were able to observe that a good scatter of Whinberry bushes survives.

The learning of the day was consolidated on return to school. And here Witches' Broom Sticks were made from Broom gathered from bushes on the Hill. The sun shone throughout and the children learned much; they had a good time too. Tom Wall



Environment

Monitoring the Rivers Clun and Kemp

As reported last month, we have been supplied with a riverwater monitoring kit courtesy of Shropshire Wildlife Trust and our Parish Council. It has now been used twice at the ford in Kempton, and at Clunton Bridge and the ford at Hill End. Sampling will continue monthly, with the possibility of additional places and greater frequency in the future, particularly if more volunteers come forward. If you would like to join us, do get in touch.

Through the River Clun Monitoring Group, we are seeking to develop a better understanding of the Clun and Kemp, and are working with the Environment Agency and others with the objective of contributing to the improvement of water quality, which is known to be sub-standard.

The tests we carry out are straightforward and require no prior knowledge. We measure the levels of Phosphate, Nitrate and Ammonia and take readings for flow rate, pH, temperature, electrical conductivity, total dissolved solids and turbidity. Finally, we sample the invertebrate life of the river, as this is a good indicator of river health.

Next month we will start reporting on our preliminary findings, but we'll need a long run of records before we can draw any conclusions.

Giant pork, sage & apple roll (serves 6 to 8)

The sausage filling also makes excellent small sausage rolls.

Ingredients

800g pork sausage meat
1 tbsp Worcestershire sauce
2 tbsp freshly chopped sage
1 tbsp wholegrain mustard
500g pack of puff pastry
1 large shallot finely chopped
Dash of Tabasco sauce
1 eating apple, cored & finely diced
Flour to dust

1 lightly beaten egg



 Preheat the oven to 200C (180C Fan). In a large bowl mix all ingredients except the egg together. Season with salt & black pepper.
 Lightly dust a work surface with flour and roll out a third of pastry to make a 12.5 cm x 30.5 cm (5in x 12in) rectangle and lay on baking sheet.

3. Arrange pork mixture on top of this allowing a 1.5cm(2/3in) border all round. Brush meat and visible pastry with beaten egg.

4. Roll out rest of pastry to make a cover for the meat and lay over and seal edges. Make slits across the roll through to the meat.

5. Glaze with more of the beaten egg and cook for 40 - 50 mins until golden brown. You may need to turn the baking sheet around halfway through cooking to ensure an even golden colour. Leave for 10 minutes before serving.


